London, Nov. 19-The body of Field Marshal Lord Roberts. borne on a gun carriage, moved slowly through the streets of London today to its last resting place in St. Paul's Cathedral.

The cortege reached St. Paul's at noon, where services were held before a throng including King George. The body was interred alongside the remains of Wellington, Nelson, Wolsely and other famous Britons.
