Majority Piles Up As 118 Counties Are Reported Complete

The Texas electorate estabished a new precedent Saturday by naming a Democratic nominee for Governor of the state without the necessity of a second primary W. Lee O'Daniel is the first Texas candidate for governor to be given the nomination for a first term at the first primary since the Democratic party adopted the primary system in

In the state-wide voting, Ernest O. Thompson ran second and William McCraw held third place. Late returns gave O'Daniel, whose total vote amounted to 489,876, a majority of 28,340 over his eleven opponents.

Other figuers gave Thompson 191,977, McCraw 183,788, Crowley 15,771, Brogdon 1,481, Far-mer 3,354, Ferguson, 3,554, Hunter 99,346, King 884, Self 1,289, McCoy 1,627, Renfro 7,901.

In the Attorney General race, Woodul led the ticket with Mann inning second; Woodul received a total vote of 291,415 and Mann received 276,196. In the same race, Robert W. Calvert received 81,574, Lewis Goodrich received 45,456, and Ralph Yarborough received 186,679.





Texas; changing the form of the oath of Texas; changing the form of the oath of office for members of the Legislature and all offices of the State of Texas; providing for an election upon such Continuional Amendment, and making an appropriation therefor.

BE IT RESQLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

Members of the Legislature, and all of-ficers, before they enter upon the duties of their offices shall take the following Oath or Affirmation:

Legislature and all officers of the State of Texas."

Each voter shall scratch out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting for or against said proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation ordering an election in conformity herewith to determine whether or not the proposed Constitutional Amendment set forth herein shall be adopted, and the Governor shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expense of such publication and electron.
