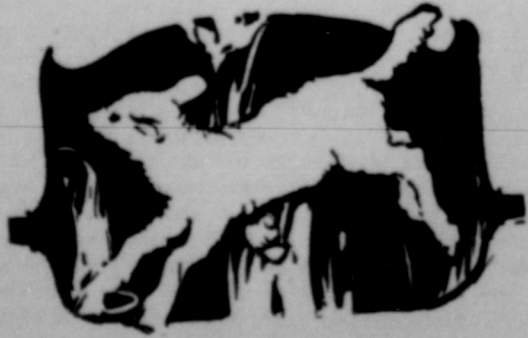

EX-SOLDIERS AND LAW ENFORCEMENT

The first and only reproduction of the history making episode of the conquering of the Cliffdwellers by the ravaging Indian nation of Navajos has been made in the filming by Paramount of "The Vanishing American."

More than 100,000 feet of lumber and 63 tons of plaster went into their building.

This is just one of the hundreds of episodes that go to make up "The Vanishing American" opening next Wednesday and Thursday at the Palace Theatre. Richard Dix appears as the Indian hero of the story while Lois Wilson, Noah Beery and Malcolm MacGregor complete the list of featured players.

CHANGE IN LAW FOR ELECTION OF TRUSTEES

On the first Saturday in April an election of school trustees will be held in each school district, and since the election law was changed in the last session of the Legislature, the law is printed herewith:

"ART 270 6a—All of the ballots for the election of school trustees in common school and independent districts having fewer than 500 scholars as shown by the last preceding scholastic census roll approved by the state department of education and exclusive of transfers shall be printed with black in on clear white paper, of sufficient thickness to prevent the marks thereon being seen through the paper, and be of uniform style; at the top of the ballot shall be printed 'Official Ballot—School District' the number or name of the school district in which the election is to be held to be filled in by the judge of the county when he orders the ballots printed.

"Any person desiring to have his name placed on official ballot, as a candidate for the office of trustee of a common school district or independent school district shall, at least ten days before said election, file a written request with the county judge requesting that his name be placed on the official ballot, and no candidate shall have his name printed on said ballot unless he has complied with the provisions of this section; provided that five or more resident qualified voters in the district may request that certain names be printed. The county judge upon receipt of said written request, and at least five days before the election, shall have the ballots printed as provided in this Act, placing on the ballot the name of each candidate who has complied with the terms of this Act and deliver a sufficient number of printed ballots and necessary election supplies to the presiding officer of the election at least one day before the election is held, the said election supplies including the ballots, poll lists and tally sheets to be delivered by the county judge by mail or any other manner deemed best, to the presiding officer of said election in sealed envelopes, which shall not be opened until election day."

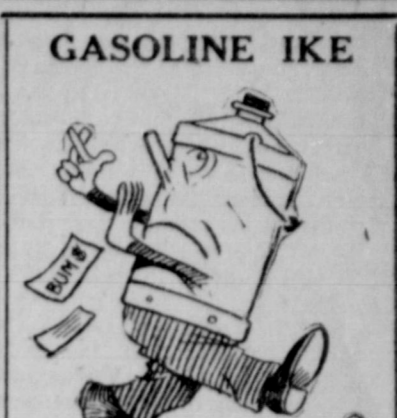

...teen miles from Atlanta, Ga., stands a great granite mound. It is believed to be the largest piece of granite in the world. It rises abruptly from the ground to one thousand feet. In circumference it measures seven and one-half miles. It is described as a bald rock, rising directly from the surrounding plains and standing in such bold relief that it can be seen for many miles.

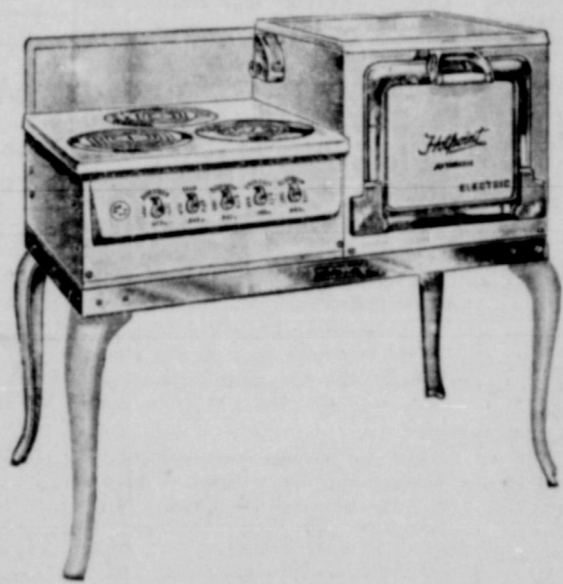
