





The Panhandle of Texas is a flow er gardon compared to Eastern and Southern New Mexico, but the traveler finds better roads in New Mexithan in our part of Texas. From Clayton to Springer, it is surprising to see the desolation and barreness vesulting from lack of rain. We saw only one dry land terrapin, and for 100 miles not a horse, cow, sheep or goat could be seen in pasture. Not even a jack rabbit, buttarfly, or grasscopper disturbed the stillness. dreds of miles not a mule was en on the roads. The few cattle and donkeys seen about the Mexican vilages, had not shed last winter's hair

Leaving Clayton in the afternoon we went to Springer and camped on the yard of the American Legion Hall. The next day we drove to Las Vegas and camped in the Meadow Brook Park. This yard was located in affaifs field on the little river that overflowed through East Las Vegas, but is now dry as all the water is taken out for brigation before it reaches the city.
