With the use of a photo electric cell, a master meter and an intricate electrical mechanism, this board is capable of testing and setting an electric meter to .2 of 1 per cent accurate.





"The trench silo is about the only way to store grain in those sections of the state where weevils do so much damage," Eudaly said In Willacy County, combines have been used to harvest a large grain sorghum crop and the grain has been placed in trench silos for fu-

"Weevils, or fire, wind, dust rats, floods, or time itself can't hurt the feed once it's in a trene silo," the dairyman commented.

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
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
