TOMATOES

Lufkin C. Of C. Asks Tomato Industry Be Protected

LUFKIN, June 16.—Directors of the Lufkin Chamber of Commerce recently adopted a resolution asking congress to include the tomato industry in the agricultural rehabilitation program and requested the state legislature to pass laws protecting farmers and prohibiting brokers from exploitation in the industry.

The action was taken after the recent collapse of the market which saw prices slum from four sents a pound to one-half a cent.

Growers reported they have found no steady markets for their product and charged buyers here with paying prices lower than those offered elsewhere. They also claimed a practice had been made of opening and closing the sheds "at will" and making it "impossible for them to know whether there was a market for their

The farmers have 1,000 acres planted in this county.

In the resolution, the Department of Agriculture is asked to furnish one or more inspectors in each of the counties producing tomatoes and that each inspector be employed to enforce the payment of the same price for identical grades.

SIXTY PERCENT OF WEBB COUNTY CORN DESTROYED

LAREDO, June 16.—It is estimated that 60 percent of the 1000 or more acres of corn planted in Webb county this season has been destroyed by the drouth and severe hot weather. Many fields that a month ago promised a heavy yield are now yellowish, dried stalks, which are being stacked for fodder. Corn planted early this year made a good crop as a result of rainfalls during February, March and April, but corn planted later, which represented the greater part of the crop, perished.
