## Boot Designer Quits

## After 42 Years Work

When it comes to boots, Justin Boot designer Eddie She has seen it all.
Ryan, Michael Jackson and lion tamer Gunther Goebel-Williams. She has tried every kind of stitching pattern imaginable in every hue of the rainbow, and
made boots with everything from frog hide "'they're too small") to codfish ("oooh, they smelled bad"). Eddie has seen the "lacers," which were popular when she started with Justin in 1949, make a big comeback. She has seen boots with pointed toes give way to toes come back into style
Now, after 42 years at Justin, she has hung up her stitching machine to retire at the age of 65. "Leaving here is the hardest thing I've ever done," she said softly. None of my family live here in fexas,
Ironically, her four-decades-long tenure in the boot business started with some square-dancing friends and a Justin Boot Company that did't want to hire her. Friends at Justin dancing club that met at the boot-making plant. "They were such nice people that I decided to work there," she recalls. "I wasn't any good at square dancing, but I hoped I would be better at making boots.
But the company wouldn't
hire her. Because she dropped around between jobs, dropped around between jobs,
never working anywhere longer than three months, the company was worried that the 23 year-old wouldn't stay.
