



Woodruff, chairmed of the Republican State Committee, caused a distinct sensation in Albany. It has given a new twist to the remarkable situation, which is confronting the "Grand Old Party" in the State, and it changed the expression on the face of some of the war horses who yesterday were boasting of their defiance ry a few moments after the fatal of the National Administration and the election of George H. Cobb as President Pro Tem of the Senate,


