## Immunization Against Influenza Given Free

Treatment Will Be Administered at the Red Cross Roomsituesdays and Thursdays of Each Week from 2:00 to 4:00, p. m.

Through the Mayo Foundation of Medical Research vaccine for free trealment is furnished the County Health Officer; the vaccine will be administered by the Red Cross First Aid Class. Treatments consists of three hypodermic doses at seven day intervals.

All who have not had the influenza, and even those who have had mild cases, are urg. ed to avail themselves of this opportunity for free treatment.

The Surgeon General's Department reports that over half a million people have already died in the United States of this disease. Inoculation by the above treatment seems to be the only hope of checking the disfase and it is hoped that the public will co-operate with the physicans by accepting this treatment so that it may be stamped out and the terrible toll of death stopped.
All physicians in the county have been supplied with the vaccine and will administer to ali who apply.
