
Rev. Rogers is preaching some great sermons, full of reason and gospel, and is met with an earnest hearing on the part of the audience.



Farms Increasing

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8 .- People are not leaving the farms of Texas, whatever may be the conditions in other states, figures made public by ant officials of the association are the Census Bureau here today on the farm census taken in January show.

Counties Show

Twenty-five counties out of more htan 250 in the Lone Star State today show a gain of 2,621 farms as compared with 1920. The remarkable part of this showing is that at the time the 1920 census was taken the country had just closed four of the most prosperous years in the farm history and was apparently facing another.

The number of farms in the 25 counties in 1923 was 11,471 compared with 9,352 in 1920. None of the so-called "big farming counties" Texas were included in today's figures. It costs several dollars to feed an animal. Figure the saving in feed from extra acreage.

One farmer in following the idle acreage idea raised enough extra feed to carry his stock until February before beginning on the regular A saving of \$400. crop.

One boy made enough to buy a heifer yearling on an idle corner of his dad's land.

Texas is probably the shortest on feed crops this year she has been in her history. This year when one buys feed he will pay dear for it. Only a few acres of cane or millet will save hundreds of dollars of maize.

Every farm can have a good stack of roughness by planting now.

The landlord who does not encourage his tenant to plant some feed now and help the country to get by another year should sell out and let some fellow have the place that will help the country to prosper.

The backbone of the country town weekly paper's support is the patronage of its rural readers.
