## "locked up" for MDA

Some of Muleshoe's most prominent citizens were" locked up for good" on July 26 between $10 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. and $4 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. at Muleshoe State Bank, to raise funds for the Muscular Dystrophy Association.

The City of Muleshoe police officers "arrested" and escorted the willing "jailbirds" to the MDA "jail" where they appeared before a judge for sentencing.
Participants could be released on good behavior by raising the $\$ 500$ bail prior to the event. "Jailbirds" who had not raised bail before the event were able to use cellular phones for last-minutes pleas for donations toward their bail.

Texas has first confirmed case

Mexico earlier this summer, where livestock on 127 premises now are under quarantine. Arizona has one case, and Colorado has four premises quarantined, all due to infection in horses.
"With a laboratory confirmed case in Texas, many other states will add extra health restrictions on livestock
from Texas," said Dr. Max Coats, state epidemiologist for the TAHC, the state's livestock health regulatory agency.
"Most states will require a certificate of veterinary inspection (health paper) for the animal, with a written statement from the veterinarian that the animals haven't been exposed to Vesicular Stomatitis,

A Bone Marrow Thon was held at the Sudan High School Commons Area July 22 , to benefit longtime Sudan resident, Waynette Fisher.

Waynette is the wife of Edward Fisher, and has three sons, Ricky, Jerry and Charlie. She was recently diagnosed with acute aplistic anemia and was told that she is in need of a bone marrow transplant and soon as soon as possible.

An overwhelming 273 people came forward from the community and the surrounding towns to have their blood tested and to be put in the National Marrow Donor Program. Not only will Waynette hopefully benefit but others who also need a transplant to give them life. This is one of the few times when average men and women are given the opportunity to save a life.

The success of this under taking was due partially to the excellent media coverage that was given prior to the event. The announcements made by the area churches helped increase public awareness.

ffect horses, cattle, sheep goats and deer, causing blis ters in and around the animals' mouths and on their tongues, hooves and teats.
When the blisters break large sections of skin slough, leaving painful open lesions. The animals become lame and unable to eat or drink until healing begins. Infection lasts about two weeks, and affected animals usually display symptoms two to eight days after exposure. To prevent the spread of infection, affected livestock must remain under quarantine until 30 days after their last lesion has healed.
"The infected horse in Fisher County apparently was exposed to the virus at an out-ofstate event by an infected and contagious horse that was not yet showing symptoms," said Dr. coats. "The infected horse in Texas, as well as two other horses exposed to the infected horse have been held in isolation and under veterinary care for the past two weeks."
"We make a preliminary diagnosis when symptoms appear and place an animal under quarantine, but an official diagnosis is dependent on laboratory results from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's National Veterinary Services Laboratory (NVSL) in Ames, IA. With the laboratory results in on the quarantined horse in Fisher County, no livestock within a 10 -mile radius around the affected horse's premise are allowed to leave the area without a written permit until 30 days after the last lesion has healed and no spread is evident.
