Texas has first confirmed case of VS near Abilene

On Friday, July 21, the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC) reported the state's first case of Vesicular Stomatitis (VS), diagnosed in a horse near McCaulley, a small town in eastern Fisher County, about 35 miles northwest of Abilene.

The Vesicular Stomatitis virus outbreak began in New

Mexico earlier this summer, where livestock on 127 premises now are under quarantine. Arizona has one case, and Colorado has four premises quarantined, all due to infection in horses.

"With a laboratory confirmed case in Texas, many other states will add extra health restrictions on livestock

from Texas," said Dr. Max Coats, state epidemiologist for the TAHC, the state's livestock health regulatory agency.

"Most states will require a certificate of veterinary inspection (health paper) for the animal, with a written statement from the veterinarian that the animals haven't been exposed to Vesicular Stomatitis,

For several weeks, TAHC inspectors have been working at inspection sites on roads in West Texas to check incoming livestock and health papers; and are assisting show, fair and rodeo officials with livestock inspection. Dr. Coats ap-

plauded New Mexico's effort to prevent the spread of the outbreak, pointing out that livestock officials there quarantined infected premises and restricted animal movement from surrounding premises within a 10-mile radius.

Grants awarded to improve rural access to Internet

TEMPLE — "The Information Superhighway is being introduced to rural America through \$7.5 million in grants to 29 education and health care organizations in 23 states," said George Ellis, State Director of Rural Economic and Community Development Service (RECDS), formerly Farmers Home Administration. "The grants for this type of technology are developed through the Rural Utilities Service (RUS), an agency within USDA's Rural Economic and Community Development mission

area." The grants will help to build the infrastructure needed in rural America as we enter a new century, a new era of technological innovation, according to Wally Beyer, RUS National Administrator. "These grants will improve the quality of life for real people through improved educational and health care services, both of which are priorities of the Clinton Administration."

This year, the RUS' Distance Learning and Medical Link rural schools to other

classrooms in rural and urban areas, providing advanced courses and interactive educational opportunities. The grants to health care organizations will help allow rural citizens access to telemedicine services bringing specialized and general care closer to home.

"This is where the county road meets the Information Superhighway," Beyer said. "These grants will improve the educational opportunities for over 95,000 young people in school and give them an equal footing in the increasingly

competitive market place. The medical grants will expand the health services available to approximately 108,000 rural Americans and make it easier and more affordable for them to receive quality health care."

A total of 16 educational organizations nationwide were granted more than \$4.5 million and 13 health care groups received almost \$3 million. Each grant will be supplemented, or leveraged, with funding from state and local sources. The supplemental funding totals more than \$15

million.

According to Ellis, RUS received 247 applications requesting a total of \$79.8 million in funds. The selection process, including a review by federal officials and participants outside the government, took five months.

The President's budget for fiscal year 1996 calls for doubling the grant program to \$15 million and creating a new \$100 million distance learning and telemedicine loan program. In

"In Texas, one grant for \$340,000 was awarded to Sam Houston State University," said Ellis. "The University will provide medical and educational services in southeast Texas. The system will link a medical clinic, hospital, an Indian reservation, and two county extension offices."

RUS plans call for a deadline of January 14 to file applications for next year's educational and medical link grants. It will be the only application period during the year. this event would be a full time job. Once my costume was decided upon, a photo shoot was shot south of town, in the sandhills.

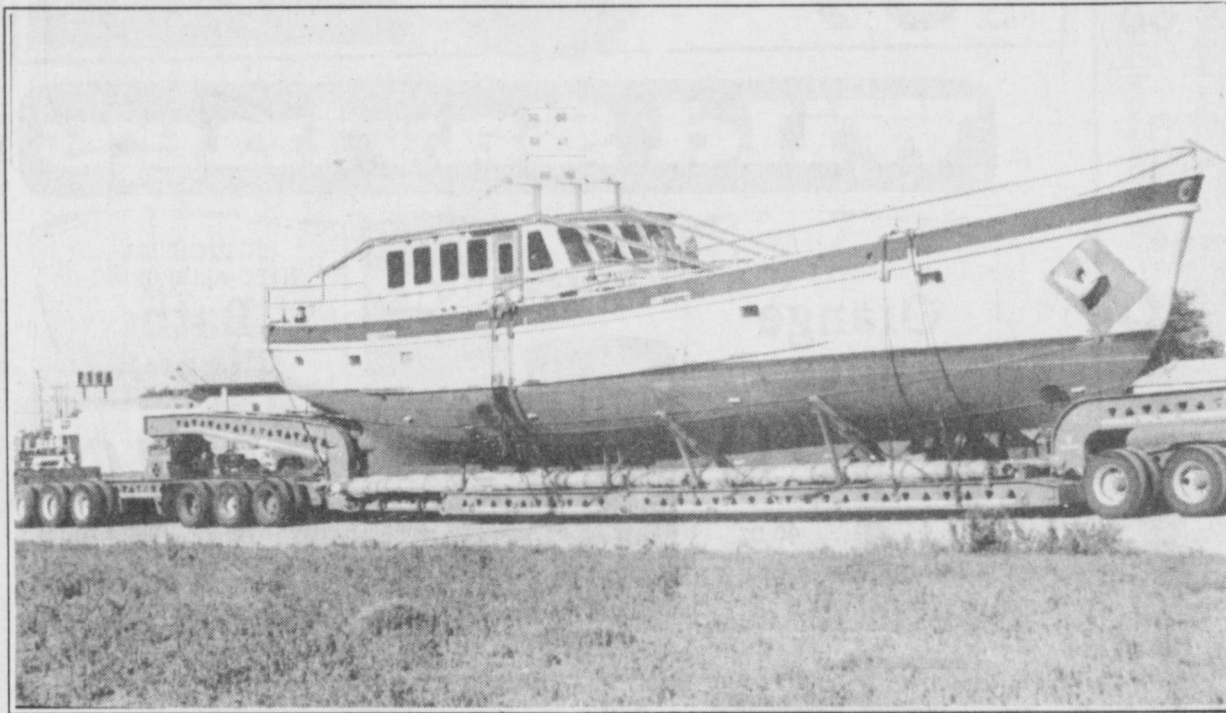
Makeup was something I know nothing about. Jeanne Cox has devoted her time to teaching us about makeup.

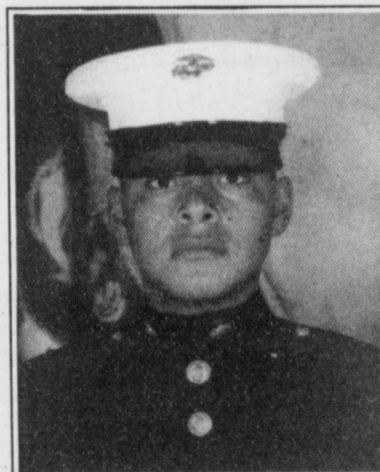


Laura Wood, as Lizzie Anderson, in "Keepers of the Legend."

If I could remember who first told this story, I would gladly give credit. But it's a tale worth retelling, regardless of the source.

own prayers as they committed their comrade to the earth without the benefit of clergy.

"Rules and regulations put up the fence," the storyteller observed several decades later, "but love moved it."

Nothing pleases me more than to see how many fences on the religious landscape are being torn down and moved today. All across our land men and women of good heart, refusing to be separated any longer by rules and rituals from ages past, are learning to love one another.

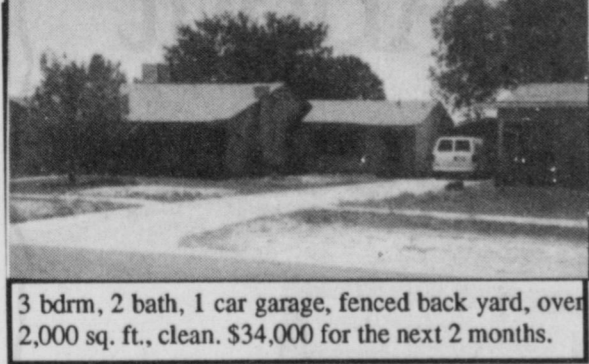

affect horses, cattle, sheep, goats and deer, causing blisters in and around the animals' mouths and on their tongues, hooves and teats.

When the blisters break, large sections of skin slough, leaving painful open lesions. The animals become lame and unable to eat or drink until healing begins. Infection lasts about two weeks, and affected animals usually display symptoms two to eight days after exposure. To prevent the spread of infection, affected livestock must remain under quarantine until 30 days after their last lesion has healed.

"The infected horse in Fisher County apparently was exposed to the virus at an out-of-state event by an infected and contagious horse that was not yet showing symptoms," said Dr. coats. "The infected horse in Texas, as well as two other horses exposed to the infected horse have been held in isolation and under veterinary care for the past two weeks."

"We make a preliminary diagnosis when symptoms appear and place an animal under quarantine, but an official diagnosis is dependent on laboratory results from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's National Veterinary Services Laboratory (NVSL) in Ames, IA. With the laboratory results in on the quarantined horse in Fisher County, no livestock within a 10-mile radius around the affected horse's premise are allowed to leave the area without a written permit until 30 days after the last lesion has healed and no spread is evident."
