HITLER AIDE SOUNDS WARNING AGAINST ATTACK ON GERMANY

NEW PROTEST SENT GERMANY
Bank of International Settlements Is Opposed To Moratorium On Loans
BASEL, Switzerland, July 9.—Directors of the bank for international settlements today instructed that a new protest be sent Germany against the moratorium on the Dawes and Young loan. It was interpreted as an attempt to protect the interests of American holders of bonds. They instructed Leon Fraser, president of the bank, to register the protest. Fifty percent Dawes and 30 percent Young loans are held by Americans.

FUNERAL RITES HELD FOR MRS. A. J. BRIDGES

Aged Hedley Woman Passes Away At Home Of Son

HEDLEY, July 9.—Last rites were held at the First Baptist church Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock for Mrs. A. J. Bridges, 68, who died at the home of her son near Sudan Thursday at noon. Rev. M. E. Wells pastor, assisted by Rev. A. V. Hendricks, Methodist pastor, conducted the services. Interment was made in the Rowe cemetery, directed by the Morman and Buntin Mortuary. The last rites were conducted by the Eastern Star chapter. Mrs. Alva Simmons and Mrs. Harry Burden sang "Will The Circle Be Unbroken."
Mrs. Bridges has been a resident of this section of the state for a number of years. She was born Sarah Summers in 1866 at Mt. Vernon, Ill. She married A. J. Bridges in 1888 at Bluming Grove, Texas. Seven children were born to this union, five of whom are living. They are Homer Bridges, Bartlesville, Okla., Clyde Bridges, Hedley, Carl Bridges, Sudan; Mrs. McKinney and Mrs. Curtis, Texaco. Mrs. Amos Melton, Belview, also survives.
Mrs. Bridges was a good example of a quiet, early Christian and friend. A large number of out-of-town friends attended the service to pay their last respects to the pioneer resident.

Farmers Will Sign Cotton Exemption Certificates Here

Exemption certificates in regard to the Bankhead cotton compulsory control bill may be signed by Hall county cotton producers as soon as the certificate forms have arrived from College Station, it has been announced by James A. Jackson, county agent. The forms are expected here within a week or two, Mr. Jackson said. Headquarters will be established in each community in the county as soon as the application forms arrive. All farmers of the various communities will be instructed at mass meetings at the various community centers concerning the applications, Mr. Jackson stated. The farmers will be notified when the mass meetings are to be held. The mass meetings will probably start the latter part of this week or the first part of next. Every person who has an interest in a crop, regardless of his status, will receive an exemption certificate in his own name, Mr. Jackson said.

ATTEND MEETING ON COTTON BILL

County Agent And Adjustment Assistant Go To Lubbock For Conference
James A. Jackson, county agricultural agent, and O. F. Washam, adjustment assistant, returned Saturday night from Lubbock, Tex., where they attended a conference. Over 125 county agents and their assistants were enrolled in the two-day course, Mr. Jackson said. S. A. McMillan of College Station, who has been in Washington for the past few months studying the Bankhead cotton bill, was in charge of conducting the school. Parker Hanna, agent of district No. 1, and O. G. Tuminson, agent of district No. 2, assisted Mr. McMillan in conducting the school. Mr. Jackson and Mr. Wilson reported that the school was successful and that they obtained valuable information concerning the Bankhead bill. O. F. Washam, who recently arrived from Quanah as the adjustment assistant here, will have charge of exemption certificates and other matters concerning the Bankhead bill in Hall county.

M'CRACKEN WILL NOT GO SERVE JAIL TERM

Supreme Court Says Senate Oversteps Its Power

WASHINGTON, July 9.—The District of Columbia Court of Appeals today reversed a lower court ruling and held that the senate did not have the power to sentence William P. McCracken to 10 days in jail for contempt in connection with the recent airmail investigation. McCracken, formerly assistant secretary of commerce for aeronautics, and L. H. Brittin, former vice-president of the Northwest Airways, Incorporated, was found guilty by the senate on February 14, and each was sentenced to 10 days. Brittin served his term but McCracken's counsel contested the senate's decision.

COTTON JUMPS \$2 A BALE IN ACTIVE MARKET AFTER REPORT ACREAGE REDUCED 32 PERCENT

WASHINGTON, July 9.—The Department of Agriculture today estimated the cotton acreage in cultivation on July 1 in the United States at 28,024,000 acres. This included Texas, 10,914,000, and Louisiana, 1,237,000. This statement is 68.6 per cent of the 40,852,000 acres under cultivation a year ago.

SMALL RETURNS TO HEART OF EAST TEXAS

Week of Campaigning To Climax With Big Rally At Tyler
CORSIKANA, July 9.—With the July primary little more than two weeks away, Clint Small will be in Corsicana Wednesday night in the midst of his East Texas campaign that is to culminate in an East Texas Small-for-Governor rally at Tyler Friday night. Small will resume his East Texas campaign at Fairfield Wednesday morning and is to speak at Jacksonville during the afternoon. Thursday's schedule includes appearance at Palestine in the morning and Marshall at night. Mincola and Quinlan are on his itinerary for Friday morning and afternoon. The Tyler rally is being sponsored by East Texas friends of Senator Small and the demonstration is expected almost to match the home-coming celebration held at Amarillo recently. Plans were in motion for a motorcade of Small supporters to arrive at the meeting from West Texas and prominent East Texas supporters of Small including Jim Strong at Carthage, George Bowman at Henderson, R. M. Wood at Gladewater, Carroll Florence at Gilmer, and Judge E. K. Bramlette and W. R. Nicholson at Longview were heading delegations from their cities which will take part in the program. West Texas groups were to be headed by I. C. Hunter and Tom Graham of Abilene. Small has only one definite date for Saturday, a night meeting at Austin's Woolridge Park at 8 o'clock. Tuesday, he will make speeches at Meridian and Granbury, the latter being broadcast over Station WBAP.
