SMALL HOLDS OWN IN WEST TEXAS RECENT survey by Senator Clint C. Small's headquarters in Amarillo shows that the Senator is holding his own in West Texas in his race for the Democratic nomination for governor of Texas.

This fact is of extreme importance because it is now being claimed that should his support in West Texas be the same as it was four years ago when he first sought the nomination, he will undoubtedly be

in the run-off following the first primary.

A representative of the Amarillo headquarters of the Senator said it appeared Small will receive more than 50,000 votes in the 30th (Small's home district) and 31st senatorial districts. This indicates an increase in the two divisions, in which he polled 49,000 votes four years ago to lead all other candidates combined. The increase is predicted despite the fact there are seven candidates in the race-meaning that on an average Samll will poll six times as many votes as any other candidate in the two districts.

In polling the 49,000 votes four years ago, Small failed to carry only four counties in the two divisions. This year, the survey indicates, he will not only receve more votes, but he may also cut down the ex-tremely small number of counties that do not give him

a majority. With continued word of his strength in the thickly populated sections of East, Central and South Texas, where he was practically unknown four years ago, it appears certain Senator Small will be in the run-off




