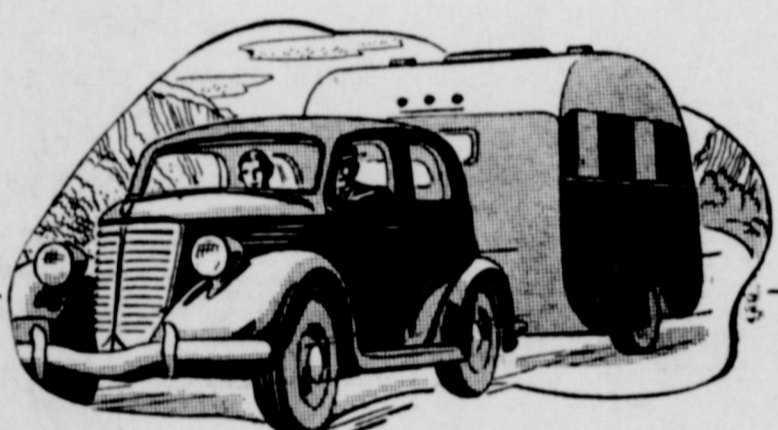
Salt Water Will Prevent Cramps From Summer Heat

In industry, a method of preventing heat cramps is to take a tablet of pure salt or a mixture of salt and dextrose with each drink of water.

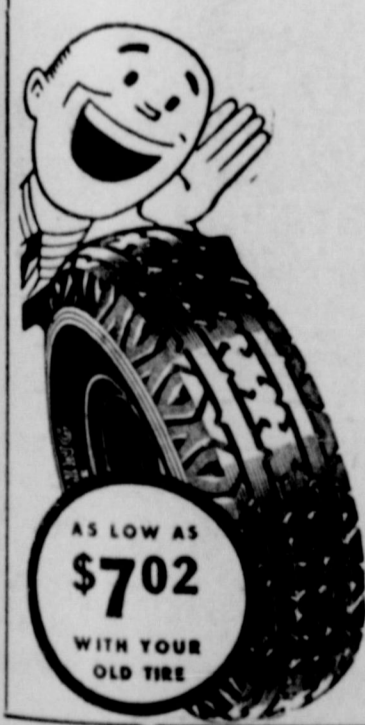
