### CATTLE BUYING IN COUNTY TO END TODAY

Last Quota of 500 Head To Be Filled Today

Purchasing of cattle by the government in Hall county will cease today when the last quota of 500 head is filled, according to information from the office of County Agent James A. Jackson.

Dr. John A. Phillips, of Miami, veterinarian purchaser for the government, has been here since Monday buying drought stricken cattle for the government, and will complete his work in this county today. He has been assisted by Josh Lamb, of Memphis, as appraiser.

When the last quota is completed today, a total of 6,560 head or more will have been sold to the government by stock raisers in this county. Although more than 3,500 head remain listed with the county agent for sale, it is doubtful that any more cattle will be bought, local officials believe.

### NAME DELEGATES TO FARM SESSION

Three Men From County Will Attend Second Annual Meeting at Dallas

T. M. McMurry, of Memphis, F. E. Leary, of Estelline, and J. A. Leary, of Turkey, have been named as the official Hall county representatives of the second annual meeting of the Texas Agricultural association, in meeting in Dallas on December 5, 6 and 7.

Announcement of the appointment of the local representatives was made yesterday, although consideration of appointments have been under way for some time. They were appointed by County Agent James A. Jackson.

More than 1,800 delegates from 200 Texas counties are expected to attend the Dallas meeting which is being combined with a meeting of the Texas Cooperatives, Inc.

Farm speeches will be held each of the three days with election of officers scheduled for the last day. The Hall county representatives will probably leave for Dallas next Tuesday, December 4, Mr. Jackson said.

### EXPECT NEARLY 5,000 FANS HERE FOR TITLE CLASH AT FAIR PARK

The Memphis Cyclone and Matador Matadors battle this afternoon at Fair Park stadium for the football championship of District 4-B. The title game starts at 2:30 o'clock.

Between 3,000 and 5,000 fans were expected to be here for the clash, coming from every corner of the district, which extends from Wellington to Spur, and including more than two dozen intervening cities.

**Matador, intent upon victory and believing it has the club that can turn the trick, is here almost to a man. As one Matador fan stated, "I doubt if there are a half a dozen people left in Matador."**

The Cyclone, just as intent upon victory as ever the Bullfighters could be, is set for the struggle. Its fans are as certain as the visitors the local club will be the one that pushes on into bi-district competition next week.

**Choices Divided**

With other lovers of the game who are here, the favoritism seems to be about equally divided, according to the section from which they come. Those from Section 1 are anxious to see the team representing them go another notch higher, and those from Section 2 are equally strong for the Matadors.

The colorful parade toward Fair Park stadium will get underway about 1 o'clock as fans start filing into the stadium to secure choice locations among the nearly 2000 bleacher seats. The SRO sign probably will go up nearly an hour before game time, and by the time the starting whistle sounds, the field will be encircled by thrills-seeking spectators.

**'First Come, First Served'**

Admission this afternoon is 25 and 50 cents. No seats are reserved, making the proposition one of "first come, first served."

Taking things easy for the past two days, Cyclone and Matadors are at the peak of conditioning for today's clash. Not a serious injury is reported from either eleven, although the Cyclone will be hampered by two or three hurt players. Every member of the regular line-ups is expected to be on the field for the opening play.

**Appear Equal**

The Cyclone has a far more impressive record than does the Matador outfit, but the Bullfighters have played a much tougher schedule. The visitors will hold a slight weight advantage over the Cyclone starters, and on paper seem to have more capable reserve

strength, despite the fact that Coach Harvey Stanford stated that his substitutes are so weak that he had played entire games with only 11 men.

Memphis probably has a more versatile attack, although the two clubs run similar plays off like formation and seem to have the same nature of ball-toters. The Cyclone boasts a fine over-head charge—one that is not likely to be equalled by another Class E team—but at the same time Matador has scored its allotment of touchdowns through the air.

### May Depend On Defense

With these phases of the game practically equal, from all indications, the final outcome may rest upon the defense. The Cyclone showed that it is capable of putting up strong resistance whenever it was necessary by holding the Wellington Skyrocks scoreless, but the team has, in its overwhelming victories, failed to show such an outstanding defense.

The Bullfighters displayed strong defensive ability on several occasions, holding clubs that were virtually their equal to not more than one touchdown, while the same clubs ran up wide margins over other opponents.

### Championship Playing

From every indication, from every angle, this afternoon's battle is going to be more than just a championship tilt in name. It should produce championship playing on the part of individuals, and thrills that reach such magnitude only when titles are at stake.

Apparently it will be one of those games where the score is exceedingly close, where each team holds a continual threat and which will not be fully decided until the final whistle.

## Memphis Celebrates Thanksgiving By Dinners, Grid Game, Services

Turkeys and football will reign supreme all over the nation today, and the Memphis area will be no exception to this program.

Thanksgiving Day in Memphis will see a district high school football championship at stake, with gridiron fans attending from a radius of 150 miles. This major event, combined with a special Thanksgiving program by the local churches, a number of social events and the conventional "turkey-dinner" gatherings in every community in the section, will complete a full holiday for residents of the Memphis area.

At 2:30 o'clock this afternoon the Memphis High school Cyclone gridsters will clash with the Matador High Bullfighters at Fair Park stadium, with District 4, Class B honors at stake. Hundreds of fans from the entire district are already arriving for the game, which is by far the most outstanding game in the section today.

During the game practically every business house in Memphis will be closed, so that managers, employes and customers may attend.

Only the cafes, drug stores and filling stations will open their doors at all today, and those institutions have agreed to close for

## FOOTBALL TAKES THE DAY

The "spirit of Thanksgiving" in Memphis, as in many other cities throughout Texas and the nation, has turned into the "spirit of championship football" for the day.

Hundreds of visitors from over the entire district will be here this afternoon to witness the clash of the Memphis Cyclone and Matador Matadors for District 4-B honors. Their Thanksgiving dinner will be had in a cafe and many of them will spend most of the day traveling to and from the game.

At first glance that indicates little of the spirit of giving thanks. But after all, the occasion was originally one of merry-making and happiness — and where could one find greater pleasure and entertainment than that in a well-filled stadium, with cheerful, happy fans watching the drama of gridiron battle as played by eleven of championship caliber unfurl before them? Thanksgiving is and should be one of the happiest of holidays. To spend the one-day vacation at a title gridiron tilt is to make the most of the opportunity.

Memphis has had better ball clubs in the past than it has this season, but perhaps never before has the city been so "football minded". This season not only marked the return of the Cyclone to championship competition, but it also marked a new era in the sport here. Through the work of local civic organizations and the athletic council, some of the finest lighting equipment obtainable was secured to make the playing of night football possible, and for the first time, the team is playing within a first-class stadium.

The season will end for either the Cyclone or the Matadors this afternoon, while the other will continue into bi-district competition in quest of the regional crown—highest of Class B football honors. Each club is given about an even chance to be the one that continues the race. Whether the Cyclone is the one to continue, or completes its schedule, it cannot be denied, all things considered, that this has been one of the most successful seasons in Cyclone history.

Memphis, following its usual habit of being "a step ahead" of other cities of its class, has considered the visitors at today's game. Memphis is interested in winning, of course, but first of all it thinks of the impression it will leave with the visitors—whether they enjoy themselves and leave with a feeling they have been given special consideration while here. It is a characteristic of the city to show a real, warm-hearted welcome, and it has, because of this, gained the recognition of being one of the most friendly communities in the entire Southwest.
