The low of 49 came Tuesday night. Monday night's temper-ature, following a .43 of an inch rain, was 52 degrees. An additional .25 of an inch had fallen Saturday.

This week's moisture brought the total for the year to 29.55 inches in Memphis, far surpassing the first 8-months period of any year recorded since 1907. when records were started. The heaviest year's rainfall since that year was 34.75 inches in 1926.

Temperatures for the week are as follows: Wednesday high, 80, low, 53; Tuesday, 70-49; Monday, 70-52; Sunday, 93-69; Saturday, 93-67; Friday, 98-67; Friday, 98-67; Thursday, 97-67.

The District Court hearing on the injunction against the tax-collecting firm of Vance Swaim of Lubbock has been set for next Wednesday, according to the court docket.

The injunction, which was granted about five or six months age by District Judge A. S. Moss, rest ains the tax-collecting firm from carrying out the terms of a contract made between the firm and the Hall County Commissioners Court. In addition, it also restrains the commissioners court. from approving the surety bond filed by the Swaim firm.

The contract with Swaim was made last February. and would give the conectors 15 per cent of the amount of delinquent taxes collected. Six Memphis lawyers are acting as attorneys for the plaintiffs. The case is recorded as J. P. Montgomery et al vs. Vance Swaim.
