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

### Texas To Be Exterminated AUSTIN, Dec. 26.—Gasoline

Illegal Entry Into

racketeers in the boundary counties, who haul motor fuel into Texas by night from Oklahoma, Louisiana or New Mexico and pay no tax on it to Texas highways or schools, are marked for extermination by Comptroller George H. Sheppard.

"First blood" in his enforcement drive was drawn recently at Perryton, in Ochiltree county on the northern fringe of the Panhandle, where a motor fuel dealer was convicted of selling tax-free gasoline, hauled from Oklahoma under cover of darkness, to farmers for six cents a gallon. The dealer was fined the minimum of \$100 and two other charges against him still are pending in district

Since this test-case was finished, numerous other boundry dealers have remitted voluntarily the state's four cents per gallon tax on gasoline bought under similar circumstances. One check covered taxes due on more than 1,700 gallons of gasoline.

The comptroller said Oklahoma tax authorities are giving full cooperation in the campaign, providing documents and witnesses.

Meanwhile the enforcement staff of some 70 persons is "bearing down" against other types of violators, Mr. Sheppard said, and has




