





They have never considered themselves as operators of poultry and ogg packing plants, but, in reality, that is what they are. ICE SHORTAGE IN HOUSTON CUTS DOWN SUPPLY TO NON-ESSENTIALS



Excessively hot weather and not a lack of supplies has made it necessary to con-serve 100 tons of ice in Houston a day. Just how to meet the local situation and at the same time not cause the small consumer to

suffer was a problem for the food administration and the ice dealers of Houston to decide. The result of a conference on Monday afternoon at the office of Administrator Peden was the decision to cut the non-essential users of ice to 75 per cent of their normal consumption, including all users of ice above 200

Soda fountains, soft drink stands, ice cream manufacturers and similar industries will feel the order rather sharply-many of them already in the throes of adjusting their business to the limited ration of sugar allotted them. It is expected that they will care for their reduced allotments of ice by eliminating the broken ice exposed to the air in troughs and on counters. The practice of shaving ice by restaurants, soda fountains and other such users the administration announces should be elimi-

The public is requested to avoid delaying the ice man. Owing to a scarcity of help he is probably serving a larger route than ever before. Co-operation on the part of the householder will enable him to cover a greater territory, thereby minimizing meltage and at the same time release labor for other essential purposes.

There is no need for hystercs," says Administrator Peden. There is no danger of an actual famine in ice, but there is a serious need for the elimination of all waste and extravagance. If the public will co-operate by avoiding unnecessary waste in the use of ice there will be plenty to supply everybody.'

IF USED AS HOG FEED IT CANNED GOODS FOR HOME

Housewife's Preserves Can Not Be Accepted for Army or

Although the American housewife is urged to can every ounce of fruit or vegetables possible as patriotic food conservation measure, her product must be reserved for civilian use. Home canned and preserved goods can not be purchased or accepted as gifts for the army or navy, the Missouri division of the food administration has announced.

Patriotic persons all over the country have been offering to organize workers in their vicinity to supply American soldiers and sailors with food prepared at home. While this spirit is appreciated and considered praiseworthy, the food administration believes it can be turned into channels that will do exactly as much for our armed forces and the allies as though it had provided them with millions of cans

or jars of home-preserved food. No government department is permitted to accept any article without paying for it. But even if home-canned goods could legally be bought, their purchase would be impossible, the food administration has pointed out, because of the difficulty acceptance of small lots would entail in the way of inspection. Supplies reasonably large units and must be uniform both as to ingredients and containers. With shipping space precious this uniformity is doubly important that the greatest possible quantity may be packed in a given space. Every additional million of jars filled by housewives for home use, however, release an equal quantity of commercially sunned goods for export.

BIG BUSINESS HIT BY FOOD EXPERT

"Hindering the Big Job" for Private Profits, Says Dr. Wiley.

Declaring that "We should include all commodities in the price-fixing scheme," Dr. Harvey W. Wiley, the best known food expert of the United States, gives emphatic indorsement of the position of the organized farmers, in the current issue of Good Housekeeping. Those who oppose general price fixing, he says, are "Hindering the Big Job."

"As an illustration of how not to do things in accordance with this formula," says Dr. Wiley, "I may call attention to the fact that congress authorized the fixing of the price of wheat, but did not authorize the fixing of the price of flour or bread Nor did it authorize the fixing of the price of anything the farmer employs in cultivating his crop.

"Thus, as the president says, the farmer justly complains of an artificial price fixing which limits his income and does not in any way protect him against the greed of those who have things to sell to him. He feels that he is entitled to this protection. He also feels that the consumer of the bread made from his wheat is entitled to protection."

Dr. Wiley says that on his way to the office recently he stopped at one of the best retail grocery stores in Washington to ask the price of a fivepound package of whole-wheat flour. It was 50 cents, or 10 cents a pound. The farmer got 17 cents at the most for the wheat needed to make it, leaving a margin of 33 cents. "I pay at a mill near my farm 10 cents a bushel for grinding wheat. For grinding five pounds of wheat the charge would be not quite one cent, which leaves 32 cents for the container, the cost of transportation and the profit of dealers."




