COUNTY SCHOOLS GET STATE HELP

Rural Schools Receive \$2 Of State Apportionment Aid, Totaling Over \$2,700

Schools at Brice, Eli, Deep Lake, Gammage, Webster, Nevlin, Parnell, Wolf Flat, Indian Creek, Baylor, Pleasant Valley, Penn Creek, Salisbury, Weatherly, Buffalo Flat, Bridle Bit, Leach, Alaska, Friendship, Churchman, Fairview, and Tampico this week are receiving two dollars per capita from the state toward paying the salaries of the school teachers.

The money is being distributed by the county school superintendent, and it totals \$2,758. The money received this week from the state makes \$5 of the \$19 that will be received for state apportionment this year.

Police Chief Issues Fireworks Warning

Chief of Police Ed McCreary this week warned Christmas celebrants that the shooting of fireworks within the five zone of Memphis would not be tolerated. He stated that all violators of the ordinance against shooting fireworks in the fire zone would be subject to fine.

The attention of property owners was called to the fact that shooting of fireworks in buildings or in congested areas constitute a fire hazard.

All vendors of fireworks have been notified by Chief McCreary to warn those who buy fireworks against setting the crackers off in the fire zone, which includes the business square and all immediately adjoining blocks.

SOIL CONSERVATION SCHOOL IS HELD AT MEMPHIS CAMP AREA FOR ASSISTANT FARM AGENTS

"Range Conservation" has been the subject of study for assistant county agricultural agents from eight Panhandle Plains Counties here this week, as Soil Conservation Service district officials gave lessons in pasture furrowing, stock water pond construction, and diversion structures for utilizing flood waters for irrigation.

The Memphis Soil Conservation Service Camp Area, lying in Hall, Donley, Childress, and Collingsworth counties, was selected for the instruction site because of the numerous and varied SCS projects.

Those here this week giving the instructions were R. C. Nelson, Regional Agricultural Engineer of the SCS; Fred C. Newport, Regional Agricultural Agronomist; and Eugene C. Buie, Associate Agriculture Engineer for

Following the initial meeting of Panhandle citizens here last Tuesday, the various delegates are now engaged in arousing interest in their own communities and organizing representations for the forthcoming rally.

Originally sponsored by the chambers of commerce and county courts in Randall and Deaf Smith counties, the idea has spread rapidly. Recognizing the importance of immediate action, representatives in the various counties are now holding meetings to publicize the next general meeting and form an active campaign directed toward proper governmental officials.

Phases Of 1937 Farm Program Are Outlined

County Agricultural Agent R. E. L. Pattillo has returned from a district farm meeting in Sweetwater and stated that general plans for the 1937 agricultural conservation program have been approved by the Secretary of Agriculture after conferences of representative farmers and Extension staff members had gone over the 1936 work and suggested needed changes.

Cotton and wheat, peanuts and rice, the crops listed as soil-depleting in which Texas is most interested, have been subject to very few changes in the revision.

Cotton is again rated at five cents a pound and the base will be determined in about the same manner as in 1936 but with provision for adjustments such as those indicated by measurements (Continued on page 7)

Over 23 Miles Of Terraces are Laid In Turkey Sector

Over 23 miles of terraces have been built in the Turkey vicinity under a soil conservation plan worked out by Turkey citizens and farmers recently.

The terraces have been made on the farms of Mark Lane, Sam Hamilton, and George Kelley. County Agent R. E. L. Pattillo and a crew of workmen from the Memphis CCC camp have assisted in the surveying.

Police Will Bear Down on Traffic Law Violators

"Traffic law violations in Memphis must be stopped," Police Chief Ed McCreary declared to The Democrat yesterday.

"We started an active campaign two or three weeks ago to stop the flagrant traffic law violations in Memphis, but as yet very few have paid any heed to the campaign," Chief McCreary said.

Local citizens are well informed as to the traffic laws, and there is no excuse for their continual violations, McCreary declared.

Beginning immediately, every person who makes such traffic law violations as not stopping at stop signs, turning around in the middle of streets in the business district, and the like, will be arrested, he stated. "There will be no exceptions," he said.

COTTON GINNING TOTAL IS 15,963

Below Ginnings in County At Same Date Year Ago; 1936 Crop Is Almost All In

There were 15,963 bales of cotton, counting round bales as half, ginned in Hall County from the crop of 1936 prior to December 1, 1936, as compared with 16,418 bales ginned in the county to December 1, 1935.

These figures are released by the Department of Commerce, Bureau of the Census, and were compiled by C. Lee Rushing, special agent.

The ginning report as of December 1 this year represents almost the total crop of the county this year, it is agreed; whereas ordinarily cotton is ginned in the county after the first of the year. The severe drought of last summer resulted in a short crop.

It has been estimated by cotton authorities of this county that the total 1936 crop will range from 17,250 bales to 18,000 bales.

Interest Is Keen In Affair; FFA Boys Enter Chickens

Thirty exhibitors from Hall County and immediate vicinity entered birds in the Annual Hall County Poultry Show which opened here Monday morning and closed Thursday afternoon. There were 203 entries in the show.

C. A. Williams, poultry raiser of Salisbury and a director of the Hall County Poultry Association, won most of the champion and grand champion awards. His single-comb White Leghorn cock was the grand champion cock of the show, as was his single-comb White Leghorn Cockerel.

The grand champion hen was a Dark Cornish Game entered by Williams and his son Charles Jr. The grand champion pullet was a Rhode Island Red entered by Sam Cowan.

"The quality of the exhibits far surpasses the show held here last year. Interest was excellent in the show this year, and the judging was excellent," Riley W. Carlton, secretary of the poultry association, stated.

Rural Schools Receive \$2 Of State Apportionment Aid, Totaling Over \$2,700

Schools at Brice, Eli, Deep Lake, Gammage, Webster, Newlin, Parnell, Wolf Flat, Indian Creek, Baylor, Pleasant Valley, Penn Creek, Salisbury, Weatherly, Buffalo Flat, Bridle Bit, Leach, Alaska, Friendship, Churchman, Fairview, and Tampico this week are receiving two dollars per capita from the state toward paying the salaries of the school teachers.

The money is being distributed by the county school superintendent, and it totals \$2,758. The money received this week from the state makes \$5 of the \$19 that will be received for state apportionment this year.

Police Chief Issues Fireworks Warning

Chief of Police Ed McCreary this week warned Christmas celebrants that the shooting of fireworks within the fire zone of Memphis would not be tolerated. He stated that all violators of the ordinance against shooting firecrackers in the fire zone would be subject to fine.

The attention of property owners was called to the fact that shooting of fireworks in buildings or in congested areas constitute a fire hazard.

All vendors of fireworks have been notified by Chief McCreary to warn those who buy firecrackers against setting the crackers off in the fire zone, which includes the business square and all immediately adjoining blocks.

SOIL CONSERVATION SCHOOL IS HELD AT MEMPHIS CAMP AREA FOR ASSISTANT FARM AGENTS

"Range Conservation" has been the subject of study for assistant county agricultural agents from eight Panhandle Plains Counties here this week, as Soil Conservation Service district officials gave lessons in pasture furlowing, stock water pond construction, and diversion structures for utilizing flood waters for irrigation.

The Memphis Soil Conservation Service Camp Area, lying in Hall, Donley, Childress and Collingsworth counties, was selected for the instruction site because of the numerous and varied SCS projects.

Those here this week giving the instructions were R. C. Nelson, Regional Agricultural Engineer of the SCS; Fred C. Newport, Regional Agricultural Agronomist; and Eugene C. Buie, Associate Agriculture Engineer for

Phases Of 1937 Farm Program Are Outlined

County Agricultural Agent R. E. L. Estill has returned from a district farm meeting in Sweetwater and stated that general plans for the 1937 agricultural conservation program have been approved by the Secretary of Agriculture after conferences of representative farmers and Extension staff members had gone over the 1936 work and suggested needed changes.

Cotton and wheat, peanuts and rice, the crops listed as soil-depleting in which Texas is most interested, have been subject to very few changes in the revision.

Cotton is again rated at five cents a pound and the base will be determined in about the same manner as in 1936 but with provision for adjustments such as those indicated by measurements (Continued on page 7)

COTTON GINNING TOTAL IS 15,963

Below Ginnings In County At Same Date Year Ago; 1936 Crop Is Almost All In

There were 15,963 bales of cotton, counting round bales as half, ginned in Hall County from the crop of 1936 prior to December 1, 1936, as compared with 16,618 bales ginned in the county to December 1, 1935.

These figures are released by the Department of Commerce, Bureau of the Census, and were compiled by C. Lee Rushing, special agent.

The ginning report as of December 1 this year represents almost the total crop of the county this year, it is agreed; whereas ordinarily cotton is ginned in the county after the first of the year. The severe drought of last summer resulted in a short crop.

It has been estimated by cotton authorities of this county that the total 1936 crop will range from 17,250 bales to 18,000 bales.

made good. There's Harry Montgomery, who now is bureau chief for the Associated Press in Phoenix, Ariz.; John Forkner, now in the advertising agency business in Amarillo; Ted Read and Jerry Sitton, who are doing big things in Kilgore; and Adrian Odum, who edited the Hereford Brand before choosing advertising as his future field and moving to Childress.

If my boy ever wants to be a newspaperman (though let's pray he doesn't) I want him to start here. It may be superstition, but there must be something to training here if so many make good elsewhere.

Some months ago I was assigned to a job which required much traveling over the Panhandle. I was very much pleased because it meant I would get to see again some of the scenes that had been familiar before I "went west to seek my fortune" in another state. But it was not as I expected.

Most profound of the shocks was my first view of the Memphis-Clarendon road. Traveling the new route west of the railroad was like venturing forth in an entirely new country. Gone were those sandy lanes and washed-out places beside gully culverts. Missing too was that delightful winding drive around the big hill north of Wayside.

But I found a familiar scene the other day. I drove from Memphis to Wellington.

I found a lot of old companions on that route—a lot of bumps that hadn't moved a fraction with the years. The same bridges were there, the same rocky hill-tops and the same sandy fords with the same little pools of stagnant water.

If ever there is a pave-the-road-to-Wellington movement, the sponsors will find me an ardent supporter.

It was on that trip to Wellington I did something entirely new for a newspaperman. I got up and drove 15 miles to find Tom Parker barely up and storing away biscuits and sausage. When a newspaperman can beat a farmer up in the morning he's good.

I haven't reached that stage where my greatest delight is recalling events that were. But never do I return to Memphis that I don't get to reminiscing. Most of those memories are of boyhood because I hardly had become accustomed to the stroke of a razor across my pony chin when I left.

There are a lot of things—like the time a bunch including me made the mistake of visiting certain noted notables of the community burning a fiery cross in Broome's pasture... or the time Carl Harrison, Adrian Odum myself, et al, rode bicycles to Hedley; or when Hubert Dennis and Little Sug Lemons hide out in plowed furrows and catch passes that helped the Cyclone tie Clarendon 20-20... or the time Bill Morgan was mud-balled at a certain Halloween party on Main street... or outings with the Boy Scouts in M. J. Draper's big truck.

I get to thinking sometimes of my first job on The Democrat, when Claude Wells put me to work "stuffing" sections of a 52-page Christmas edition. I almost quit the newspaper business after that task.

Then there was another time I wished I had quit the first time. It was when, trusted for the first time on a news story, I dashed up to Main and Church streets to view an automobile accident and came back to write:

"A sedan driven by Miss Smith collided with a truck driven by Mr. Jones on Monday at Main and Eighth streets. No one was injured but Miss Smith's fender was bent."
