



To Increase President's Salary.

Washington, Jan. 18. - The provisions for an increase of the 000 and the salaries of the Vice president and the Speaker of the House to \$20,000 contained in Senate amendments to the legislative, executive and judicial appropriation bill were taken up ren. in the Senate today and the point of order made against them by Senator Borah was furthur considered, resulting in the adoption of another amendment, fixing the Speaker's salary at \$15,000. Senators Depew, Elkins, Bourne

and Owen favored the increase proposed in the Senate amendments, while Senator Bailey opposed them.

Mr. Baily declared that every position in the gift of the Government should be sought for the honor and not for the emolument. and that the salaries should be sufficient to provide only a living and education of children.

"But we are told here that the salaries are inadequate to provide entertainment which high officials are expected to give," said Mr. Baily. "I am inclined to think that it would be a fortunate thing to reduce the salaries if to reduce them would reduce the amount of entertaining. SHETLAND PONIES.

Active as Terriers, Sure Footed as Mules, Patient as Donkeys.

Shetlands are "foaled in the fields, live in the fields and die in the fields. They have a rooted dislike for indoor life and thrive best when allowed to feed naturally on green grass, with perhaps hay in winter. Until two years old nature provides a soft, woollike covering. Afterward the mature coat of hair appears, to be shed each spring, when the ponles appear sleek and handsome. Full grown, they are immensely strong, with wide quarters, powerful legs and a great width and depth over the heart and lungs. And, as Bengie wrote in 1870 in his "Tour In Shetland:" "The Shetland pony is the most lovable of animals in the wide creation. They are sprightly and active as terriers. sure footed as mules and patient as donkeys. The horse is accredited as the noblest of the lower animals, and the Shetland pony stands at the head of this noble race as the most intelligent and faithful of them all."

The great value of the Shetland to the coal miners lies in its ability to work in the low galleries in thin seamed pits, where other ponies could not travel. Their strength does not correspond with their diminutive proportions, and they will travel thirty miles a day in the seams, drawing from twelve to fourteen hundredand they are treated, if roughly, not unkindly.-St. James' Gazette.


