

SAN ANTONIO REJECTS **COMMISSION PLAN**

Proposal to Change City Charter Defeated by Majority of 168

Clarence Gilmore, one of the authors, believes it would greatly benefit the state if this change were made.

"The great expense of running for state office, as well as county office," he says, "and the demoralization of business on account of our biennial election, seems to me to be sufficient reason for changing our present tenure of office. Our resolution provides that no state or county officer shall be eligible for re-election, which will have the effect of giving an officeholder an opportunity to discharge the duties of his office without any reference to its effect on his next election, and will also save to the state the time which officeholders necessarily have to spend each two years in making the campaign to succeed themselves, even if it be for a second term.

"Of course, occasionally an inefficient and incompetent man is elected to office, but these cases are so rare and the benefit derived from the four-year term are so great that I believe it will have a selutary effect to adopt the amendment.





SAN ANTONIO REJECTS **COMMISSION PLAN**

Proposal to Change City Charter Defeated by Majority of 168

San Antonio, Tex. Feb. 4-Unofficial returns tonight complete show that commission government was defeated by a majority of 168 votes. The Commission Government League claims victory and has issued notice of s

The total vote cast was 14, 292, of which 7,230 were against the charter and 7,062 for it.

There were many stormy scenes during the entire day The city had 300 special police men at the polls, there being as many as ten and twelve at some polls. Arrests of commission government advocates were frequent. Judge John H. Clark, chairman of the Commission Government League campaign committee. was arrested on a charge of abusive language and remained in the city jail more than an hour before he was permitted to give bond.

There were a number of personal conflicts, but none of a serious consequence. Tonight an effort was made to secure a writ permitting the Commission Gov ernment League to guard ballot boxes, This was refused. A notice was then given of a contest

FOUR-YEAR TERM FOR STATE OFFICERS URGED

Constitutional Amendment Changing prisoners. Election Law Is Proposed In

Austin, Feb. 3.-A radical amendment resolution introduc-Russell. The object of the reso the drainage district. lution is to change the term of office of all county and state officers from two to four years. Clarence Gilmore, one of the authors, believes it would greatly benefit the state if this change were made.

"The great expense of running for state office, as well as county office," he says, "and the demoralization of business on account of our biennial election, seems to me to be sufficient reason for changing our present tenure of office. Our resolution provides that no state or county officer shall be eligible for re-election, which will have the effect of giving an officeholder an opportunity to discharge the duties of his office without any reference to its effect on his next election, and will also save to the state the time which officeholders necessarily have to spend each two years in making the campaign to succeed themselves, even if it be for a second term.

"Of course, occasionally an inefficient and incompetent man is elected to office, but these cases are so rare and the benefit derived from the four-year term are so great that I believe it will have a selutary effect to adopt the amendment.


