Paper Shell Pecaas in Tluree Years. Editor Home and Farm: Any farmer in the cotton
growing belt of this country, if he has a pecan or hiekory stump with growing sprouts around it has a foundation for a paper shell ree near at hand. Any time during the coming winter two of these sprouts around one stump can be grafted-whip or cleft graft-and if they fail to grow then two more sprouts around he stump can be chíp budded in March, Aprilor May, and if these fail then two more sprouts of next year's growth can be set
