NEW FOOTBALL MENTOR HIRED HERE BY BOARD

Coach Jake Spann Of Hollis Has Guided Winning Elevens

Meeting in called session Wednesday night in the office of Harry Delaney, Memphis School Board members employed Jake Spann of Hollis to serve as head coach at the high school here for the term 1937-38. The Hollis coach appeared before the board and accepted a contract to serve as head coach for boys' athletics. Coach Spann and wife will move to Memphis some time during the summer. Other than coaching, Spann will teach in the high school. Coach Spann will succeed Coach Harold (Chesty) Walker, who for the past five years has produced first-rate grid teams here. Spann has coached boys' athletics for 10 years in Texas and in Oklahoma. He won two district championships in Texas, at Canyon and at Coleman. During his six years at Hollis, Coach Spann's teams have won the 14-team conference three times in football and were runners-up twice. He had two undefeated grid teams. Last year his football men scored 224 points to their opponents' 22. His basketball teams won the (Continued on page 6)

LOCAL YOUTH SUCCUMBS AT HOME TUESDAY

Had Lived In County For Past 15 Years; Buried At Quail

Everett Shockley, 18 years of age, died at his home, 515 North 5th street, here Tuesday morning, April 13, at 2 o'clock. Heart attack was given as the cause of death. Funeral services for the deceased young Memphian were conducted from the family home Tuesday afternoon at 4 o'clock by S. M. Ziegler. Interment was in the cemetery at Quail, directed by Hodges Funeral home. Pallbearers were Bill Moore, Herman Rittenberry, E. E. Slay, J. L. Stewart, J. F. Barkley, and Johnnie Slay.

Good news to Hall County farmers and local business men was the arrival this week of a shipment of farm checks from the state headquarters to the amount of \$45,049.35. The money, arriving here Wednesday morning in 263 separate checks, representing the second large payment to Hall County cotton producers within the past few weeks for compliance with the 1936 governmental crop control program. It was estimated by attaches at the county agent's office Wednesday that approximately 550 additional cotton checks will be received here within the next few weeks for compliance with the program. These 550 checks are expected to total around \$85,000. To date, Hall County cotton producers have received 479 checks from the government this year for a total of \$218,623.71. W. S. Bennett, assistant county agricultural agent, stated, Thirty-one checks for some \$4,800 have been received a few at a time at the agent's office since the first batch of checks for \$158,000 arrived here the latter part of March. A large majority of all checks received have been issued, and the county agent, R. E. L. Pattillo, will be in Turkey Friday this week to hand out checks to farmers in that sector. In all, some 2,000 checks for over \$300,000 are expected to pay Hall County farmers for meeting the government farm regulations for the past year.

Included in the athletic program will be a boxing contest between Billy P. Hall and some other member of the high school. Hall has issued a challenge to all fighters. Admission of 10 cents will be charged. A program of music and other numbers will be held in the auditorium, while the carnival booths and games are to be conducted in the gymnasium. The carnival is being staged by the junior class under the direction of Miss Annabelle Perkins, sponsor, and Sam S. Cowan, senior sponsor.

Advices Producers To Buy Cotton Of High Grade Staple

Following is a letter received by J. L. Dalby of Chillicothe from Robert Mayer, president of the American Cotton Shippers Association, in regards to the short-staple cotton situation existing in this section:

Dallas, Tex., March 16, 1937. Mr. J. L. Dalby, Chillicothe, Texas. Dear Sir:

In reply to yours of the 15th, asking whether or not you should plant on your West Texas farm "half and half seed."

I would strongly urge you in the strongest possible language not to plant such seed but to plant one of the better known staple seeds such as will produce at least fifteen-sixteenths inch staple. There are many brands of certificated seed and it is not my purpose to specify any particular brand but to convey to you the deplorable state of affairs now existing in the marketing of cotton in a large part of Texas.

Many of our members have received orders this season with the stipulation "Texas cotton excluded" and unless Texas adopts radical measures towards improvement of staple, in many sections of Texas, cotton will be unsalable. We know the argument advanced by many farmers that locally they get the same price for "half and half" that they do for better staple cotton as the local buyers put the average run of the town receipts. This, however, is a fallacy, if the average town is "half and half" everything is bought on that basis but should the average be 15-16, competition will quickly force the average to be raised to that level.

At the present time there is a difference between 15-16 and 16 of approximately 2c per pound, and I am absolutely sure this difference will widen as it is practically impossible to sell this junk.

Consequently, I urge you to plant the best staple cotton possible and persuade your neighbors to do likewise and you could not do a greater service to your State and to the South as a whole.

J. W. Wells, honorary member of the Winnie Davis Chapter U. D. C. and the last remnant here of the once proud army in Gray, marched away to his immortal home in response to the Great Commander's call March 20, 1937.

There was no middle ground with him as far as the Confederacy was concerned. He served, loved and honored the Confederate cause in his youth, in mature years and unto the time of his death. Being too young to enter the war at the beginning, but in 1862 he answered the call of a new-born flag; was willing to die if need be for home and country. He served through those years of war to the bitter end, fighting, enduring, giving a man's service in loyalty and devotion, in courage and gallantry.

In every relation in life Mr. Wells measured up to the highest standard of the Southern gentleman; in patriotic, religious and social relations ever the kindly gentle Christian soldier, he typified the life of the old South and combined with it the progressive ideas of the new.

It is well to dwell upon the lives of the men of the South who came back to a ruined and devastated country after the war was over (when property was confiscated under an alien government) to bring order out of chaos. Since that fateful day at Appomattox when the ragged and starving soldiers of the most glorious army of all time clustered around their

immortal chieftain in an agonizing farewell they have justified the confidence he had in them by obeying his injunction to return to their homes and become worthy citizens. That the Confederate soldier has done this and has implanted in his descendants a love of home and country is proven by the vast number of Southern men who won honors beneath the Stars and Stripes in the Spanish-American War and the World War.

Now, there are only a few more feeble ones left, for the great armies of the Confederacy sleep hushed in the alabaster arms of death. As part and parcel of the immortal gray-clad host Mr. Wells met death with the same indomitable courage that enabled him to face the problems of life.

STATION—A decrease in the acreage of cotton and an increase in wheat per cent in grain production of Texas are indicated by the results of the state figures, according to the extension economist in agricultural planning, a committee which has recommended farm men and women to W. E. Morrison, who headed a committee that tabulated the results. All percentages are based on acreage.

ists compiled the state figures, which have been transmitted to AAA officials in Washington. The AAA uses the recommendations of the county committee to discover trends in local agriculture. It is understood that future AAA programs may contain provisions which reflect the results of the county, state, and nationwide recommendations.

Further recommendations of the county committees were that pasture land on farms be increased by 13 per cent over the 1929 figure; that corn acreage be increased by seven per cent; and that a large increase in the acreage of legumes would be beneficial. The recommended increases are to come out of lands which have been classified by the Bureau of the Census as land devoted to crop use.

Rose points to the fact that while "Texas Sweetheart No. 1" might have held little meaning when last year's contest was announced, the title now is identified with the 1936 winner, Miss Faye Cotton of Borger, a glamorous beauty who is well on her way to stardom with Universal pictures.

"Millions of people throughout the United States and in other lands read the Cinderella story of Miss Cotton, who was lifted from behind the cash register in a restaurant to the spotlight of the amusement world," Rose said. "Night after night, Miss Cotton appeared in the Casa Manana revue on the world's largest revolving stage and in the world's largest cafe-theater. She wore a gown of real gold, worth many thousands of dollars, and Everett Marshall sang love songs to her. One of those songs, 'The Night Is Young,' has become a radio sensation."

And now Rose is seeking a successor to Miss Cotton as Texas Sweetheart No. 1. Every girl sent as the representative of a city to the state-wide contest in Fort Worth will be given an audition so that, even if she does not win the highest prize, she may win the opportunity to appear in the cast of Casa Manana revue, if she wishes. In addition, her fare—by train or bus—will be paid from her home city to Fort Worth and return, and, if the distance is such that it is necessary for her to spend a night in Fort Worth, her hotel room also will be provided by the Frontier Fiesta.

Last year 80 cities took part in the contest, and every entrant and every city participating received a great deal of publicity. Twenty of the girls were given parts in the Casa Manana revue last year. The method of choosing Miss Memphis is left up to the city, Rose said. She may be selected by a civic club, a newspaper, or a local theater.

Senator Clint Small has introduced a sales tax measure in the Senate at Austin, and since every person in Texas will be affected by the bill if made a law, the following facts concerning same are given for the readers' consideration:

Hall County merchants do a total retail business of \$4,137,000 and a 2 per cent sales tax as now proposed in the Texas Legislature would yield \$82,740 from this county while the sales tax burden to be borne by each resident of the county would amount to \$4.88 per year.

These figures are based on a recent census of the United States Department of Commerce, and are contained in an eight page pamphlet, "Texas Taxes, a Suggested Solution," being distributed by Rev. J. Earnest Stack of Houston, editor of the Christian American.

Other enlightening facts contained in the pamphlet include: A two per cent sales tax will yield \$28,652,300 in annual recurring revenue to the State of Texas.

The yearly volume of business done by the 70,000 retail establishments of Texas is approximately \$1,432,615,000.

Under a 2 per cent retail sales tax each inhabitant of Texas would be required to pay \$4.72 per year.

Sales tax collections per store under a 2 per cent levy would amount to \$417.20 annually. Forty-five per cent of the sales tax revenue would come from 10 counties in Texas in which the largest cities are located.



SIDELIGHTS

When the dust storms began anew in the Southwestern area a few weeks ago, Congressman Phil Ferguson of Oklahoma and I began a drive to secure special provision to combat the effect of these destructive winds. In this we were assisted by several other members from that area.

At first we endeavored to secure an appropriation similar to the one which made two million dollars available under my amendment last year. The Budget Bureau, however, declined to approve an additional appropriation.

In making this drive, we found there was an unobligated balance of funds in the current soil conservation program. When attention was called to this, the Department and the Director of the Budget agreed to recommend that a sum not exceeding five million dollars of this balance be made available for a wind erosion control program planned especially for the Dust Bowl area of Texas, Kansas, Colorado, Oklahoma, and New Mexico. The President has also approved such an allotment.

Congress must now act on the appropriation, and while the Appropriations Committee is reducing appropriations wherever practicable—and properly so—we nevertheless have hopes that this amount of the unobligated funds may be made available.

The program would be emergency in nature and would be in addition and supplemental to the regular farm program. It is intended to help farmers curtail the blowing of dust this season and next and lessen present losses.

The Department of Agriculture has outlined the provisions for this emergency work in the event the funds are made available. The main feature is the enlargement of the area of land on which wind erosion control practices may be carried out for payment under the soil conservation program. Under the present set-up, land diverted from general soil-depleting crops is eligible for payment if wind erosion control work is done. The new arrangement would provide that all the crop land in the Dust Bowl area is eligible for the wind erosion payment, if recommended practices are carried out.

If funds are allotted, a maximum allowance of 75 cents per acre will be provided for each farmer who participates in this program, and on practices completed before June 1, 85 per cent of the amount earned will be paid as soon as possible after their completion. The payments for the regular program will be made at the end of the crop season.

The practices which the farmer may carry out include several types of contour listing and furrowing and planting of cover crops. Any practices put into effect are to be approved first by the county committee.

An allowance of 25 cents an acre will be made for contour listing, and payment will also be made for certain other types of listing and furrowing. Fifty cents an acre will be allowed for cover crops seeded on the contour or in combination with certain types of listing. The allowance for other planting is 35 cents an acre. The cover crops in this instance are limited to sorghum, sudan grass, or millet.
