

The Census Bureau officially has figured the country's population today as 127,521,000—a gain of .71 per cent since last year, and a rise of 4 per cent since 1930.

During the last six years, the population has been recording a net annual growth of approximately 900,000. This is only a little more than half the average annual gain for the ker 1920-30 decade.

If the rate of growth continues to decline in this way, it H. B. Bennett. wont be long before we have a stable population-or even, possibly, a decreasing one.

What all this would mean to our social and economic organization is obvious-and distressing. It would mean an end to the era of expansion which has lasted since our coun-er-N. W. Durham. try's birth. Cities no longer would increase in size; or, if they did, would make their gains at the expense of other cities or tie between Joe William Whaley of rural areas.

Every commercial venture from agriculture to real estate sub-dividing would feel the effects.

Beyond that, there is the depressing feeling that America's youthful vitality has been played out; that we have passed as a nation of young manhood to middle age, and that the era of slow decline is not far away.

Net income upon which the tax is assessed is gross income less the deductions allowed by law, Such deductions include business and professional expenses, such to employees, taxes, losses, interest paid, bad debts, depreciation, of taxpayers.

The Revenue Act of 1934 provides for an earned income credit in addition to the personal exemp. tion and credit for dependents, etc., for the purpose of computing the normal tax. Having arrived at the net income, the next step is to deduct the personal exemption and credit for dependents. The balance represents the "surtax net income." The next step is to deduct from such balance the earned income credit and other credits to which the taxpayer is entitled. The remainder represents the amount of net income subject to the normal tax of 4 percent. Any amount of surtax net income which is in excess of \$4,000 is subject to the surtax. The surtax is to be compuated in accordance with the rates provided for in the various so-called surtax brackets.

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


