A goal was set for the contouring of 50,000 acres of cotton and feed lands within the boundaries of Hall County at a meeting of the county agricultural council Saturday afternoon in the office of Farm Agent R. E. L. Pattillo.

Decision to hold 20 terracing demonstrations in Hall County throughout the various rural communities during the coming year was also reached by the county advisory board.

The council set a goal for four meat demonstrations to be held in the four commissioner's precincts of the county this fall. Other than these matters, the council voted to sponsor the addition of 12 trench silos in the county and the holding of two beef cattle demonstrations, 10 cotton demonstrations and 10 grain sorghum demonstrations.

Actual home demonstration work is to begin in Memphis within the next week, as the Works Progress Administration Home Economics program for this city gets under way.

Mrs. L. C. Smyers, Home Economics supervisor, is to have charge of the government work. She plans to conduct a survey of every home within the city limits of Memphis. Home makers, assistants to Mrs. Smyers, will call on every Memphis housewife within the next several days, making a study of the household needs.
