TESTS SHOW COTTON BAGGING BEST COVERING

The superiority of cotton bagging as compared with jute as a wering for American cotton pales has been demonstrated from a physical standpoint by the United States department of Agriculture in test shipments of cotton to Germany and return to the United States.

Four weights of cotton bagging signed by technologists in the division of cotton marketing and oven in the cooperative testing aboratories at Clemson college, South Carolina, and North Caro-lina State college were used in the tests. The lightest weight cotton bagging compared very favorably with jute. A represen-tative of the department reported from Hamburg that "the bales overed with cotton bagging were much neater and in better con-dition generally than those cover-

ed with jute bagging."

Breaking strength tests were also made of the cotton bagging and these tests together with the shipping test indicate, says the department in a report on the ex-periments, that "from the view-point of durability, protection to the cotton, and neatness, cotton pagging is a more suitable cover-ing for the American cotton bale

People should not act as if they were making a great sacrifice if they devote a little of their time to such purposes. We should love our home town so much, we should be so ambitious to see it go ahead, we should be so conscious of the gains that people who have initiative or ability or industry, should be willing to give some time each week to helping forward such causes .-R. 


