## WAGON YARD TO BE REPLACED BY A MODERN GIN

Another one of the old landmarks of Memphis has passed into history by the razing of the old wagon yard fences and sheds by T. T. Harrison the past week. The office building will be left and will be remodeled and made into a first class gin office.

Mr. Harrison informs The Democrat that, as soon as the material begins to arrive, actual work will be started on the erection of a gin plant 38x83 feet, large enough to accommodate ten 80-saw gin stands. In addition to the main gin building, there will be the engine and boiler building, cotton storage building and a cotton seed building. The plant will be equipped with every modern device for cleaning, and burr extracting machines will make this one of the most modern in the South.

Mr. Harrison expects to have all buildings completed and ready for the machinery which is expected to begin arriving by June 1. It will be installed immediately upon arrival and ready for operation when the fall season opens.

## MEMPHIS AT THE FORKS OF THE ROAD (An Editorial)

Memphis has reached that stage of growth where the road forks. It depends upon the citizenship of Memphis which road will be taken.

Will they choose the road that leads to a greater Memphis or that which leads to a mediocre town, satisfied with what it is and has, and without ambition to become greater?

Memphis now is enjoying a good healthy growth and is growing more urban-like every day. New business houses are taking the place of old. Still other new business houses are being erected to give added business institutions to the business section. Old residences are being replaced with new, and dozens of additional new residences are being built to give shelter to more inhabitants, and the cry continues for more housing facilities.

The business section is already paved—forty blocks of the residence section will be paved during this year—the bonds having been sold and the contract let for the paving.

A new three-story hotel is being erected to care for the additional transient people, as well as provide better hotel and dining facilities for the home-people.

An up-to-date laundry building is being erected and new laundry machinery will be installed.

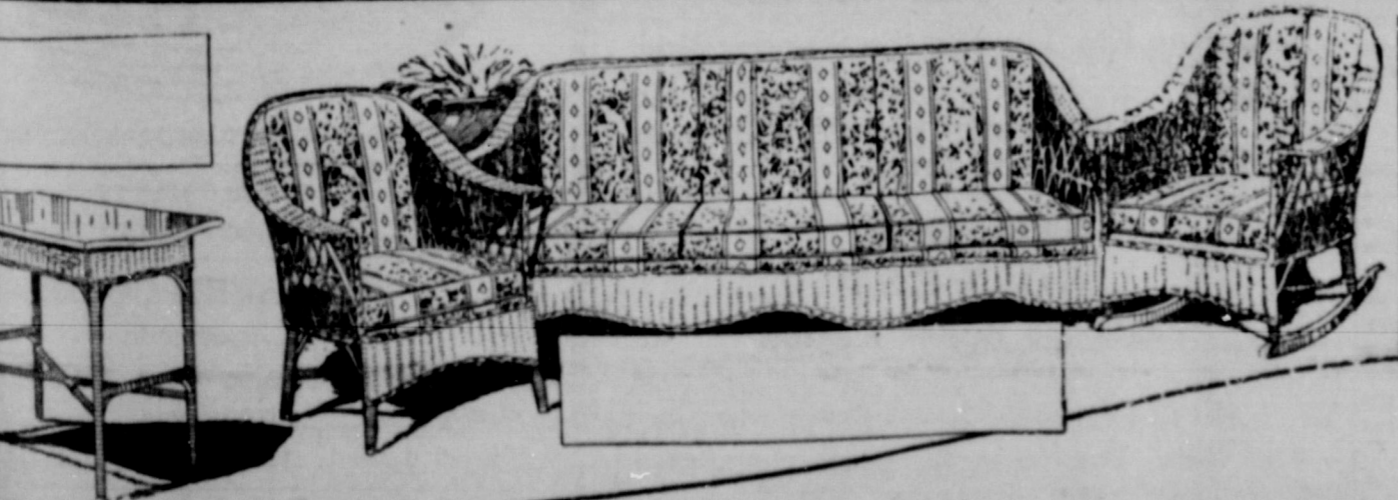

THE PASSING DAY

WILL H. MAYER Former Dean Department of Journalism University of Texas

Closely following the meeting to organize a Chamber of Commerce for East Texas, Lampasas proposes a Central Texas Chamber of Commerce. Evidently the Lampasas people do not like to see Texas divided into just two parts and leaving every place free to decide in which division it belongs. The Jasper News-Boy is urging Jasper county almost touches the East Texas body because it thinks Jasper is too far removed from the center of its activities, although Jasper county almost touches the East Texas boundary line.

This is a reminder that some body should divide Texas into its proper parts for sectional activities. Most of us thought Corpus Christi in East or Southeast Texas until it joined the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. How would you go about telling a stranger whether Dallas is in North, East, or Central Texas? Amarillo is in West Texas when it comes to entertaining the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, but we think of it as being in North Texas or perhaps as in Northwest Texas. Certainly it has a few commercial interests in common with Corpus Christi or Laredo. Texas territorial terminology is confusing and needs to be straightened out.

Serving Business Interests

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce has proven by results obtained that it is a much needed business organization, but there is a growing feeling that it is expanding over too much territory for satisfactory detail work. Whether that is so remains to be seen. Certainly East Texas needs a body as active as that in the West. It should function as a separate organization, for its problems are altogether different from those in West Texas. The rapidly developing country south of San Antonio has distinct interests of a kind to indicate that it should have its own organization. The Plains country, has very little in common with the Hill country around Alpine and Kerrville.

Perhaps the best solution of the matter would be to have a number of sectional organizations, where interests are somewhat closely related, and a State Chamber of Commerce that would serve as a clearing house for all of them. Without something of the kind there is likely to be an overlapping of activities that may create harmful jealousies.

Our Coast Resort

It is reported that capitalists have paid a half million dollars for lands at Point Isabel, the southernmost point on the Texas Gulf Coast, and will build there a great oceanside resort on a scale to attract nation-wide attention. It is to be something worth seeing and visiting at all seasons of the year, and in every way worthy of the Magic Valley of the Lower Rio Grande. This will mean much to Brownsville, the commercial city through which transportation will have to pass to get to Point Isabel.

More Railroads Needed

Texas needs largely increased railroad mileage and Texans are hoping that congress will act favorably on the measure to permit

existing lines to build extensions without recourse to the Interstate Commerce Commission. In fact Texans believe that the national government should dabble as little as possible in state affairs and that every state should decide for itself whether railroads should be built within its borders.

Certainly the Southern Pacific the Santa Fe and other railroads now desirous of extending their lines, have proven that they know how to look after their own finances and do not need the guardianship of any commission, and the roads with which they might possibly enter into competition are amply able to protect themselves in securing business.

City Lot Oil Boom

Almost every day brings surprises in the discovery of new oil pools in Texas. San Antonio announces the latest surprise in the discovery of oil at a depth of 11 feet in a city back yard, and this has started neighbors digging up their yards in the hope of getting oil. Not long ago an oil operator leased some land near Brownwood and put a rig to work, he told the men to go to a certain depth or until they struck oil. He left for his home in another part of the state, and on reaching there had a telegram, "Struck oil at 50 feet. What must we do next?"

Oil is not found everywhere at 11 or at 50 feet, but in practically every county in Texas where persistent effort has been made it is obtained in paying quantities, and the development appears to be only fairly started.

Fashionable Hi-Jackers

"Week-end" robberies and burglaries are becoming quite common and apparently popular diversions in Texas. The fact that in many instances women have been taking prominent parts in the week-end parties makes them partake somewhat of the nature of social functions. The women usually wait in cars at some convenient place and when the work is finished drive the hi-jackers to places of safety, where presumably the spoils are divided. The presence of women in speeding cars lessens suspicion and the chance of arrest.

### POULTRY MEN ORGANIZE TO NAB THIEVES

War has been declared on chicken thieves by farmers and other poultry raisers in Texas who have suffered serious losses from these offenders, according to advices received by the Sears-Roebuck Agricultural Foundation, Dallas, from poultrymen in many parts of the state. The Foundation has been broadcasting on radio programs over station WFAA information by authorities on methods of combatting thieves.

"With the development of the poultry industry, the country has become infested with organized bands of poultry thieves who steal out under cover of the night to rob farmers and other poultry breeders," declared R. E. Sparkman, Ellis county, in a radio talk for the Foundation. "Good roads and automobiles give thieves easy access to the good poultry mar-

kets in the cities. There are hundreds of instances on farms where families have been dependent upon the chicken and turkey crops for their living, where entire flocks have been set in a single night. Whereas our state laws provide that the stealing of any number of cattle, sheep or hogs is a penitentiary offense, poultry raisers are comparatively unprotected, as thieves must steal over \$50 worth of chickens or turkeys before the offense is classed as a felony. If captured, the ordinary poultry thief is punished for petty larceny, only, and usually gets off with a light fine."

Mr. Sparkman was a member of the 38th Texas Legislature and introduced a bill which would make any amount of poultry stealing a felony. The proposed measure failed to pass by a few votes, and now poultrymen are organizing to promote the introduction and passage of a similar law in the next legislature.

W. W. Brady, secretary of the

Collin County Poultry Association made a radio talk in which he stressed the need of organization and legislation to protect the poultry industry. He said that many are discouraged from building quality purebred poultry flocks owing to constant danger from theft. Collin and Dallas county poultry raisers, he said, have been organized for a year to fight the chicken thief, and have secured excellent results in protecting their birds by clubbing together to offer rewards for the capture and conviction of offenders who stole from members.
