Sixty-five years ago there was not a newspaper published in the broad scope of country which makes up the imperial State of Texas. The first paper printed within the bounds of this vast teritorry was in 1843. The journal was known as the Northern Standard, and it was printed in Clarksville, then a very small village. When the paper was established the Republic of Texas was one of the independent nations of the world. Col. Charles DeMois, who is remenbered by many of the older citizens of North Texas, was the editor. Subcription price of the Standard was \$3.50 if paid in advance, \$4,00 if paid at the end of six months, and \$5.00 if id at the end of the year.


