Prisoner Fights Hard to Keep out of Jail.

Joe Lawrence, a white man, who has been wanted in Hall county for the last two years to answer to a charge of assault with intent to murder, was arrested by Deputy Sheriff B. T. Johnson Sunday night at the corner of Weatherford and Houston streets. Lawrence gave the officer no trouble at the outset, but balked most forcibly when an effort was made to steer him up the steps of the county jail. There he fought like a tiger, and Johnson had to call upon members of the jail force before the prisoner could be lodged in a cell.

The charge against Lawrence is that two years ago he gouged a Hall county constable in the eye with a knife, and the man was so badly injured that he subsequently lost the use of the damaged optic.

During the attempts made by Johnson to induce Lawrence to accompany him up the court-house steps the officer was almost thrown to the bottom several times. Finally Lawrence was overpowered and literally carried to the jail office. No violence was used by the officers in the way of clubbing the prisoner, but it looked for several minutes that that would be the only way of confining the man.

Sheriff Lon Burleson of Hall county came to Fort Worth Monday night and left for Memphis, Texas, with the prisoner.—Ft. Worth Record.

An Ordinance

Regulating the shooting of fire works in the city of Memphis, Texas. Section 1. Be it ordained by the city council of Memphis, Texas, That, it shall hereafter be unlawful for any person within the corporate limits of the city of Memphis, Texas, to shoot any Roman candle, Skyrocket, fire cracker or other form of fire works on any street, alley or sidewalk or on any vacant lot or on any other property not his own.

Section 2. It is further ordained by the city council of the city of Memphis, Texas, that it shall hereafter be unlawful for any person or persons to shoot any of the above named fire works in such a way or manner as to allow sparks or any other inflammable material to fall or blow on any street, alley or other property other than that of his own.

Any person violating either of the above sections of the above ordinance shall be fined in any sum not less than one dollar nor more than ten dollars.

Passed and approved this the 6th day of December, 1910.

2 Wagons of Relics of Revolutionary War Are Unearthed.

New York, Dec. 5.—A yellowed parchment of revolutionary date, found among old family papers by two New York college men some time ago, has just led to a notable "find" of revolutionary relics.

The parchment told of the burial of some old British trinkets and firearms in a trench, beneath the brow of a hill on the bank of the Hudson, at a point about a dozen miles above the battery. The two young men, after various difficulties, found the spot, obtained permission of the owner, and began a series of excavations.

Their efforts have just resulted in bringing to light two wagon

loads of about the most interesting relics found here in recent years.

The articles include silver buckles worn by British officers, musket flints, silver regimental buttons, pipes, pottery, cannon balls and an old cannon.

An examination of an old map shows that this spot is mentioned as the site of the barracks of the British headquarters when the English soldiers held Fort Washington. Buttons were found from all but one of the British regiments, that which occupied Manhattan Island.
