## CAMP TO OBSERVE 5TH ANNIVERSARY

### Open House and Barbecue at Memphis CCC Camp and Tour of Inspection of Camp and SCS Work in Area Planned

Good Program Has Been Arranged and Plans Made to Entertain 600 Farmers and Stockmen of Memphis District

A gala celebration at the Memphis CCC camp Saturday, April 2, will mark the fifth anniversary of the founding of the Civilian Conservation Corps. Many people from Memphis and adjacent towns are expected to visit and inspect the camp throughout the day, according to Captain Fred Maxwell, Commander.

All guests are requested to register at the Soil Conservation office, where guides will be stationed to conduct parties through the camp. The tour of inspection will include a trip through a model barracks, the recreation hall and reading room, mess hall and kitchen, infirmary, and educational building. Pastry and coffee will be served in the mess hall throughout the morning.

Exhibits of handcraft work by enrollees, together with a complete portrayal of soil conservation by use of sand table, graphs, and photographs, will depict to the visitor how spare time as well as work hours are devoted. A barbecue will be given at noon on the area just south of the camp. The Memphis High School band, under the direction of Milton Pullis, will give a concert from 11:30 to 12:30. ### To Stage 'My Home Town' Elimination Contest April 13

High School Students to Try For Place at Wichita Falls W. T. C. C. Convention

An elimination contest will be held the night of April 13 at the Memphis High School auditorium to decide who will enter the "My Home Town" contest at the West Texas Chamber of Commerce Convention in Wichita Falls April 26, 26, and 27 at Memphis' representative.

Contestants must be bona fide high school students. Students in the local high school have already begun preparation on their speeches, and there will probably be about 20 entered in the contest here, according to Clinton Joyce Sheats, contest director. Miss Belle Perkins, Miss Mary Helen Hardin, and Mrs. Alfred Burks, English teachers in the high school, are assisting Mr. Voyles in coaching those entering the contest.

Seven judges will select first, second, and third place speakers. First prize will be the trip to Wichita Falls with all expenses paid and a gold-filled award; second prize a gold-filled award; and third prize a sterling silver award. The awards have been ordered and are expected to arrive within a few days.

At the convention in Wichita Falls, contestants will be divided into three groups, each group to have a preliminary contest. At each of these three contests, judges will select the best speaker, and these three will enter the finals.

The winning contestants from each preliminary will speak before the general convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce on the morning of April 27, and will be ranked as 1st, 2nd, and 3rd. First place winner will be given the Thomas Etheridge Loving Cup, which becomes the permanent property of the city winning it twice in succession.

Cash prizes will be awarded to 1st and 2nd contestants in each preliminary. Scholarships in several Texas colleges are also being arranged for winning contestants.

A tentative count of points made by schools in the Hall County Interscholastic League meet in Turkey last Friday reveals that the Memphis schools led with 146, Turkey was second with 113, Estelline had 95 1-2, and Lakeview tallied 68 1-2. Parnell with 54 1-2 points led the rural schools.

The quartet is especially adept at singing gospel songs, it is said. Recently it received 25,000 letters from fans in twenty-two states within a little over a month.

Local opinion holds that a re-routing of the road would not only give a better entrance into Memphis, but would serve a greater number of farmers than it would by its present survey.

## Available Plants Listed By Exchange

This week we have added to our list of available plants hollyhocks, goldenglow, and castor bean plants. Of course hollyhocks do not bloom the first year but because of the fact they require no attention when once established they are worth waiting for.

Goldenglow is hardy and multiplies each year, begins blooming in July and continues for about 6 weeks. Chrysanthemums should be separated now, one plant in a place about one and one-half or two feet apart. Medium rich soil until July, then add quantities of fertilizer until buds begin to form.

Daisies and phlox should be separated at this time too, and planted about the same distance apart as chrysanthemums.



acres. If he plants in excess he can sell tax free only the adjusted yield times the allotted acres. The excess is taxed 2 cents a pound. In addition to the 2 cent tax he cannot draw the subsidy of the 1937 crop, if he plants in excess of allotted acres.

Should any farmer want to do so, he can plant any portion of his allotted cotton acres in feed, provided his planted cotton acres and planted feed acres do not exceed the total allotted soil depleting acres. In case of exceeding the total the penalty will be eight times the feed payment for each acre overplanted.

Memphis Chamber of Commerce will be in use throughout the day for making announcements and introducing guests.

A general invitation to the public to attend the barbecue is made possible by the contributions of D. H. Davenport, George Sexauer, Frank Finch, the Crews Brothers, and the chamber of commerce.

At 2 p. m. a tour of the work project will be conducted under the direction of Supt. J. T. Reese. Transportation will be by Soil Conservation Service trucks fitted with seats. A loud speaker located on a pick-up will accompany the tour so that certain types of work which have been completed may be pointed out.

The tour will require about three hours, it is said, and will include visits to the farms of several cooperators. There will be shown demonstrations of pasture furrowing, stock tank dam construction, strip cropping, and terracing with grader blade, frostwork, and elevating grader.
