The three banks in Memphis report that they have almost \$3,-000,000 on deposit, an increase over last year at this time of about \$1,000,000, or a fifty per cent increase over 1927. The First National Bank, in its report, shows \$1,332,000 on deposit as compared with \$783,000 at the same time last year. The Citizens State Bank reports deposits of \$842,000, as compared with \$713,000 last year and the Hall County National Bank has on depsit \$760,000 as compared with \$463,857 last year.

Last summer (August 1928) the writer conducted an auto dairy tour to Mississippi and Tennessee to study dairy development in these states. Many of us have accepted the fact that dairy farming is a practicable thing. But Mississippi has accepted dairying whole-heartedly. The cotton farmers are milking cows, the bankers are lending financial assistance both to the farmers and to the milk plants and the merchants and business men are all boosting and cooperating. At first, it was accepted on faith, but since dairy farming has proven profitable to all concerned, dairying is now accepted as an essential to profitable farm management.





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# Simplicity of cooling system is a feature of the new Ford

The purpose of this water plant is to keep the engine cooled to a temperature that will make it efficient in operation. If it were not for this, the cylinder walls would become overheated and the pistons refuse to operate.



#### MR. NEFF AND THE BAPTISTS

ON. PAT M. NEFF, twice governor of Texas, and prom-II inent as a lawyer and as an outstanding layman of the Baptist faith in Texas, is having considerable difficulty in being confirmed by the United States Senate as a member of the United States Board of Mediation. Senator Earle B. Mayfield objects to Mr. Neff's being on the board and this objection is concurred in by all the railroad brotherhoods in the State of

It was due largely to the efforts of Senator Mayfield that Mr. Neff received his initial appointment several years ago. In the recent senatorial race, in which Congressman Tom Connally defeated Senator Mayfield for re-election, Mr. Neff was a staunch Connally supporter, so it is only natural that the Senator has no particular affection for the esteemed Baptist.

Newspaper stories relate that certain Baptist churches in Texas have swung into line, seeking to have Mr. Neff re-appointed to a position that pays \$12,000 a year, with a generous allowance for travelling expenses. Telegrams have been sent to members of Congress by Baptist ministers in this state urging that Mr. Neff be confirmed.

It is rather unfortunate, as we see it, that churches and churchmen, continue to dabble in politics. The prejudices of the moment are anything but lasting. They rise and fall with eras and scarehead in the American press. Mr. Hearst has foisted administrations and should not be considered too seriously. governor and that should he ever decide to run for public office again in this state, that the Baptist vote would be handed to him in a parcel.
