

The crowd was allowed the freedon of the city, rest rooms, tanks of ice water at every street corner, with the public square and streets roped off from vehicles, assuring safety to the crowd of pedestrians, and tables in the beautiful new \$35,-000 court house yard spread with food for the 5,000 present under the shade of the trees. The crowd patiently awaited the signal for dinner and while looking at the scene I secured a few items of interest from a manager what it took to feed the people: 20 fat beeves, 2,000 loaves of bread, 3 barrels cucumber pickles, 100 gallons hot coffee. The vast crowds were handed each a plaque with a hunk, (nothing else describes it) of juicy brown tender beef, bread and pickles and go to the kettles and get coffee, then off picnic style eat and come again, not a push, no ill manners, no loud talking, in fact I never saw such complete mastery of a crowd and yet no commands and no reproof, for the people knew how to behave like ladies and gentlemen, which I take it they were. I have seen it different in older states and the most astonishing fact at least to a Missourian was, there was neither a fire cracker, cannon cracker, or other death dealing toy for sale in the city, but plenty of harmless toys for young folks and children. 
