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OLD AGE PENSION INVESTIGATORS BUSY IN HALL COUNTY THIS WEEK

Investigators were busy in this vicinity and throughout the state this week re-investigating present old age assistance recipients granted aid under the old pension law, Acting Director Orville S. Carpenter of the Texas Old Age Assistance Commission stated.

"No one will be removed from the rolls until a thorough re-investigation of his case has been made," he declared.

Last week Carpenter explained that there would be no arbitrary or mechanical cut in the rolls, but that each case would be studied and re-investigated upon its own merits before any action was taken. Rumor that 36,000 aged would automatically be dropped from the assistance lists was declared unfounded.

"Re-investigations are now being made in this district of all people on the rolls who possess income or property. Their cases are being re-investigated to determine whether they are eligible under the new law. But until they are found ineligible, they will continue receiving monthly checks," Carpenter stated.

Belief has been expressed that under the new statute the average assistance grant under the old age setup will be larger than the \$16 of the old. It is expected that the average grants will increase by January 1.

84-Year-Old Man In
Grocery Business
Over Decade

The sudden death of J. J. (Dad) Rogers early Saturday morning, Nov. 21, came as a shock to his many friends in the Newlin vicinity. He was preparing to go to Memphis to have a pension check cashed he had received the night before when he slumped to the floor with a heart attack. He was dead before medical aid could be summoned.

Funeral services were conducted from the Newlin Baptist Church Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock with Rev. Luther Crawford, pastor, officiating. Interment was made in the Newlin Cemetery with Hodges Funeral Home of Memphis directing.

TO ENROLL MEN IN CCC SERVICE

55 Hall County Youths Join
CCC Past Month; Must Be
Eligible For WPA Aid

Hall County needy youths will be given an opportunity to join the Civilian Conservation Corps some time in January, local relief workers have announced.

Youths eligible to enroll with the CCC are those who are eligible for Works Progress Administration aid and who are from 17 to 28 years of age, inclusive. The Hall County quota has not been set as yet, nor has the exact date of enlistment been fixed; but local welfare officials invite all eligible youths to call at the county relief office for examinations.

Fifty-five young men were sent from Hall County to the CCC service last month, 20 going to California, and 21 of the number being sent to New Mexico. The others were stationed at Perryton, and three negroes were sent to Canyon.

Tax To Be Paid On Indebtedness

A shipment of state tax stamps was received this week by County Clerk Floyd Springer to be used on all instruments of indebtedness filed for record, in accordance with a law passed at the last session of the legislature on the Omnibus Bill.

Ten cents is now charged on every \$100 or fraction thereof of indebtedness filed, exclusive of the first \$200.

The stamps may be purchased direct from Austin in 10 cent, 30 cent, 50 cent, 80 cent, \$4.80, \$9.80, and \$49.80 denominations. It is expected that banks, automobile agencies, and a few other concerns will stock the stamps.

Driver's License Law Ignored Here

Despite the clamoring by state officers last spring and summer for every person in the state to secure a driver's license, there has not been a single warrant issued here against a person violating the driver's license act.

There have been 6,300 driver's permits issued from the county tax assessor-collector's office here in accordance with the act, and it is said that only a few abide by the driver's license law.

PENSION CHECKS WILL BE MAILED

Old Age Pensioners Do Not
Get Money At Office Of
County Clerk, Stated

County Clerk Floyd Springer has issued a request to those who are expecting checks from the state old age assistance commission not to call at his office for their checks, "because I have nothing whatever to do with the checks," he said.

Old age assistance checks will be handled in the future exactly as they have in the past, and the checks should be here now as they were mailed last week.

Old age pension recipients flocked to Mr. Springer's office after it was stated in The Democrat that a list of all persons in Hall County who receive the pensions will be posted in the county clerk's office soon.

THREE-COUNTY SOCIETY HOLDS MEETING HERE

Dallas Physician On
Program; Next Meet
To Be In Childress

Dr. Jerrall Bennett, prominent Dallas physician, read a scientific paper at the regular monthly meeting of the Three-County Medical Society at the Memphis Hotel Thursday night of last week.

27 COUNTIES OF AREA RECEIVE \$13,728,480 FROM COTTON CROP

In spite of drouth and other adverse weather conditions, cotton brought farmers of this area—including Hall and 26 other counties—a return of approximately \$13,728,480 for the 1936 planting through October, according to figures compiled from the United States department of commerce ginnings report for Nov. 1.

The return for the same period last year from both seed and lint, totaled approximately \$16,655,950. The price paid for the combination of seed and lint averaged \$70 a bale, both for the 1935 and the 1936 crop. Of this amount, \$15 was for seed

Sheriff Colvin To Sell Beer,
Whiskey, And Gin Dec. 1st
From Courthouse Steps

For the second time in a month, Hall County Sheriff Joe Colvin has posted for sale at auction a quantity of alcoholic beverages.

The following will be sold from the courthouse steps Tuesday, December 1, between the hours of 10 a. m. and 4 p. m.:

Seven cases of Pabst Export beer (in cans), two cases of Budweiser beer (in bottles), 68 bottles of mixed brands of beer, 31 cans of mixed brands of bottled beer, three pints of whiskey, and two pints of gin.

1937 Automobile License Plates Received Here

Automobile and truck license plates for 1937 have been received here for Hall County auto and truck operators, according to word from Mrs. Holt Bownds, Hall County Tax Assessor-Collector. The tags however, may not be purchased before February 1st and may not be attached to cars before March 1st.

The new car plates have a black base with yellow figures. Commercial car tags feature an orange background with black figures, and the farm truck license plates have a black base with orange numerals.

A total of 2,350 passenger licenses were received here, ranging from 479-351 to 481-700. The commercial tags range from 70-301 to 70-500, and the farm truck license plates run from 38-001 to 38-250.

FORMER LOCAL BAPTIST HEAD DIES TUESDAY

Rev. Robert Morgan
Was Eminent State
Soil Conservator

Rev. Robert B. Morgan, 65, pastor of the Memphis First Baptist Church for several years, died Tuesday morning, Nov. 24, at his home in Fort Worth. Death came to the pioneer minister after a lingering illness. His health had caused his retirement from the pulpit two years ago.

Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at Grapevine, where he formerly was Baptist pastor. Dr. and Mrs. W. Wilson, Mrs. Margaret Morgan and son Jack left Memphis Wednesday morning for Grapevine to attend the funeral services.

Rev. Morgan was a native Texan and was vitally interested in soil conservation as well as soil preservation. He worked hand-in-hand with farmers and took an active part in agricultural conferences. He had farm interests (Continued on page 7)

SEASON OPENS

Hunting To Be From 7 a. m. To 4 p. m.; Bag Limit Is 10 Ducks And 4 Geese

Duck hunters of this section greeted the opening of hunting season today on migratory birds with the booming of guns and a quest along lake shores and marshes for the fowls.

Nimrods, however, must take their watches along with them on their hunting expeditions, because it is a violation of the law to shoot a wild duck before 7 o'clock in the morning and after 4 o'clock in the afternoon.

The daily bag limit for ducks is 10, with the limit on geese and brant set at four. Migratory birds are not to be taken from or by the aid of a automobile or any motorboat or sailboat.

It is unlawful to use grain or live decoys as lures in hunting the wild birds. It is also a violation of the law to hunt out of the "home" county without a license.

Duck hunting season runs from Thanksgiving to Christmas.

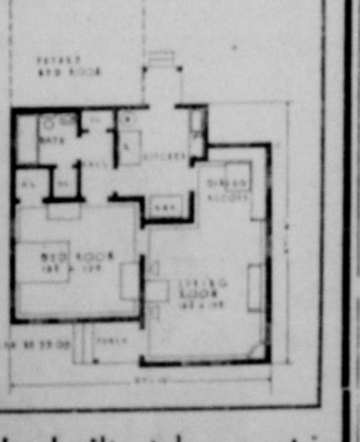
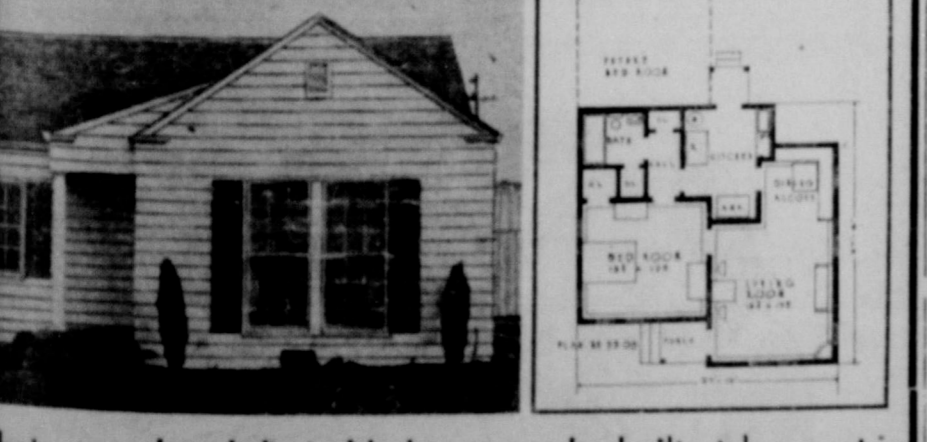

OVER 285 MILES ROADWORK DONE

Lateral Roads In This Sector Are Repaired and Improved By WPA Work Projects

More than 285 miles of roadwork are included in the Lubbock District WPA program, according to District director J. O. Jones. Counties which have shared in the district road program include Hall, Bailey, Hockley, Dickens, Floyd, Hale, Hockley, Lamb, Lubbock, Motley, Palmer, and Swisher.

Based upon statistics of September 15, WPA records show that workers in the Lubbock District have completed repairs and improvements on 213 miles of lateral roads and that work is progressing upon an additional 71 miles.

"In addition to providing work for needy unemployed persons in this area, the road program has been one of the most beneficial types of public improvement undertaken by this organization," Jones declared. "In many instances these all-weather roads established by WPA workers replaced roads formerly impassable in rainy weather. Farm people living along these routes are no longer dependent upon the

weather in getting to market. School buses and mail carriers are able to maintain schedules with less difficulty. City and rural dwellers alike will realize gratifying returns for years to come from the investment which WPA and the counties have made on these roads."

Although Lakeview won only two conference tilts all season, the Eagles was one of the strongest teams in the district, losing to the loop leaders by the barest of margins.

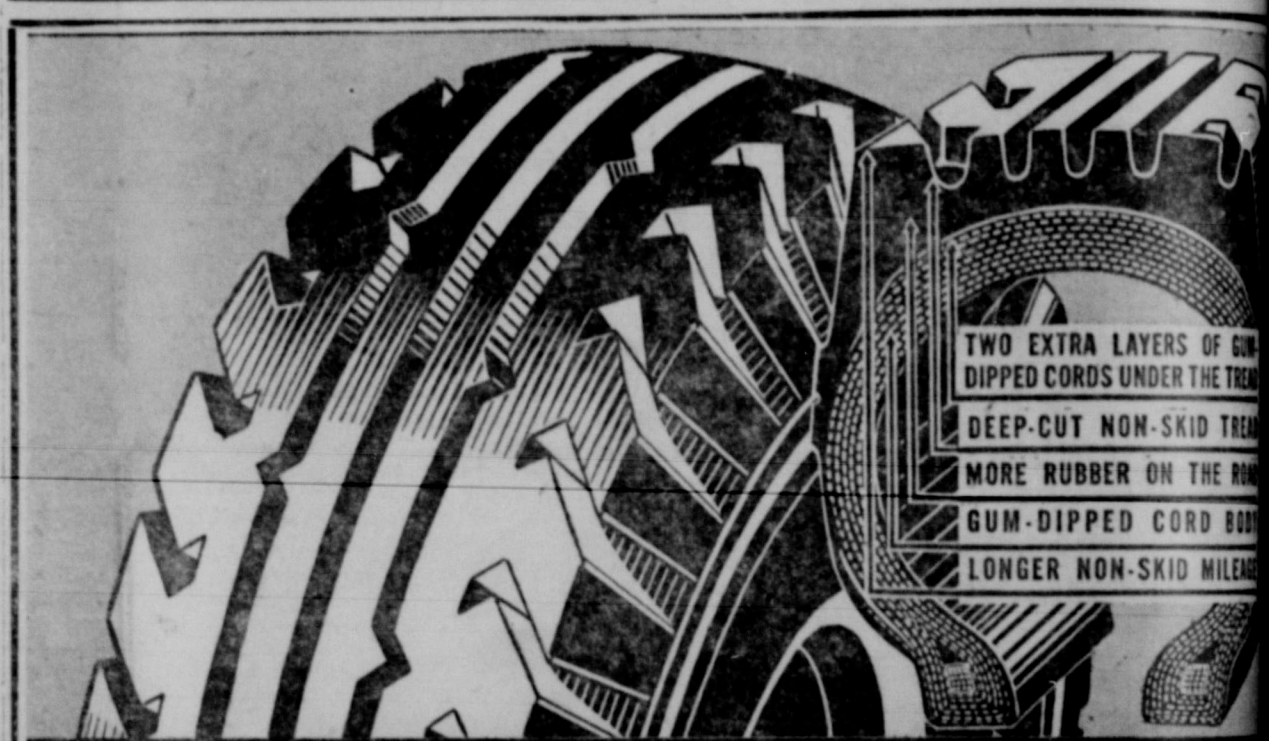
