Model Store Will Demonstrate Price Ceiling Technique

OPA Officials Will Confer With Merchants of Area at Amarillo Wednesday, Aug. 5

Joe Doakes, modern merchant, will open to the public one of his "ceiling price" stores in Amarillo Wednesday, August 5, it is announced by Joe Cooley, chamber of commerce assistant secretary. Doakes' personnel will include an official from the Dallas Regional office of Price Administration and five representatives from the Business and Distributive Education Division. Amarillo business men will assist in arranging and opening this unusual store, which will temporarily occupy the Red and Gold room of the Amarillo Hotel.

Through the efforts of the Amarillo chamber of commerce this model demonstration store is to be set up and used solely to assist retailers and wholesalers of this section to understand more fully how to comply with the General Maximum Price Regulation. Special interpretation will be given on the new regulations issued recently.

Everyone is invited to take advantage of this opportunity to study carefully the various phases of compliance under actual retail store conditions.

This modern store will be open for inspection for one day only. Officials of the OPA advise that merchants are finding compliance made easier after "visiting" the "price ceiling store," and have arranged the following schedule for this particular area: 1 a. m. 12 noon.—All firms supplying services in connection with a commodity. 1:30 p. m.-3 p. m.—All retailers and wholesalers for demonstration in model store setup, showing records to keep and those to be filed; how maximum prices are established and what merchandise and services are under control now; new regulations relating to apparel and other commodities.

3 p. m.-4 p. m.—Pictures and demonstrations of merchandise posted with "ceiling prices." 4 p. m.-5 p. m.—Questions and answer period; individual conferences.

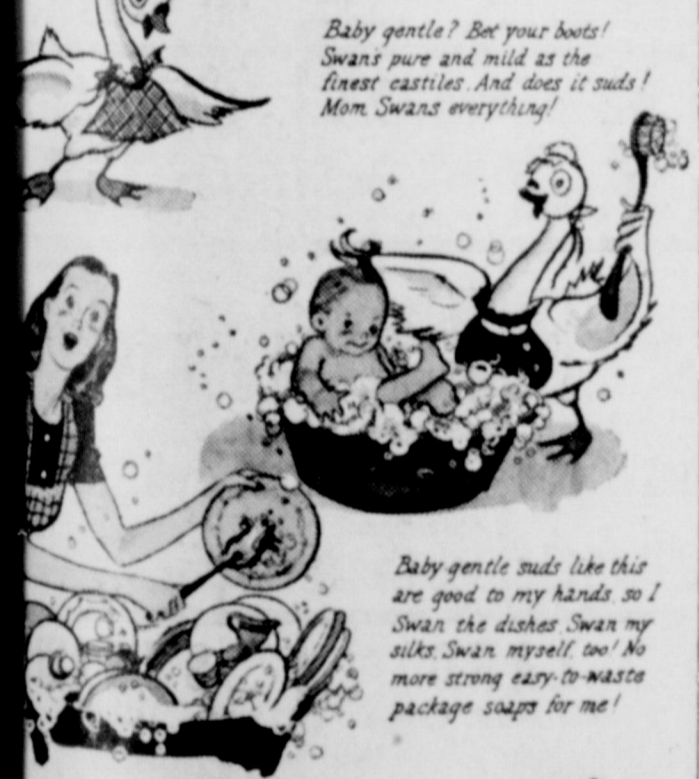

H. J. R. No. 23 would authorize the lending of \$2,000,000 of the permanent school fund for the construction of a State office building, and provide for repayment of the loan.

H. J. R. No. 24 would provide that the Legislature be empowered by local or general law, in counties having a population in excess of 200,000 inhabitants to create other courts having exclusive or concurrent jurisdiction with the county court in civil, criminal or probate matters.

Voters are urged to read these proposed amendments carefully so that they will understand what they are voting for or against in the General Election.
