TEN-YEAR-OLD PARNELL GIRL **MAKES RECORD**

MARY MOREHEAD OF PARNELL, MAKES NEARLY FIVE TONS OF MAIZE PER ACRE. RE-CORD NET PROFIT

This Yield Was Beaten in the Same Neighborhood by Chas. F. Bruce in 1913.

Little Mary Morehead, a ten-yearold Parnell girl, and a member of the Hall County Agricultural Club, who en tered the forage crop contest for the Hall County Fair prize, produced this year nearly five tons of dry maize heads upon one acre of ground. The exact weight was 9,620 pounds.

The entire work of planting and cultivating this crop was done by this little lady. The land was measured and the maize was weighed by disinterested parties, who made oath to the correctness of their work.

The crop was planted on a wet-wea ther lake, which had filled in almost level with the surrouding ground.

The cost of cultivating, an accurate account of which was a condition of the contest, was \$12.38, or \$2.58 per ton, making a net profit of \$122.38 per acre. This is, in all probability, a record for net profit for the State.

The gross yield per acre was exceeded, in the same neighborhood, in 1913, by Mr. Chas. F. Bruce, who made 19,936 pounds on two acres of ground, br 9,918 pounds per acre.
