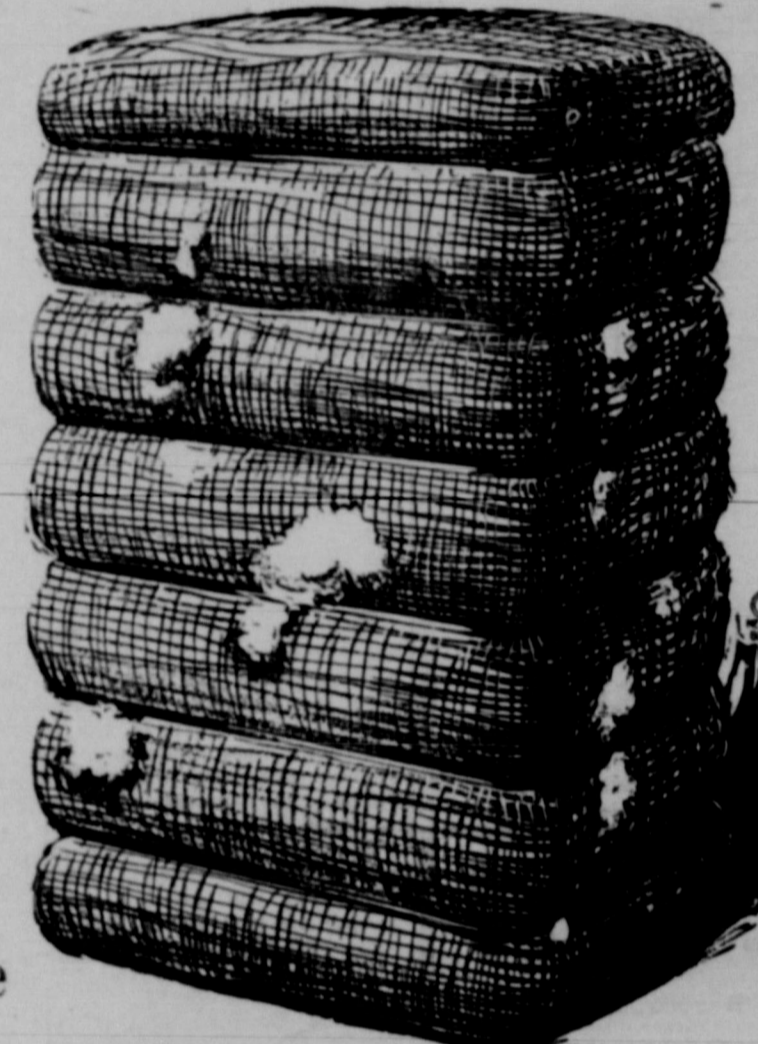

Memphis Will Be Represented on 4 College Gridirons

Ezell Champion will return for his third year of varsity football at West Texas State College, Canyon, this year. Ezell has played guard and blocking halfback for the Canyon college crew the past two years, and is almost assured of a place on this year's team. A good blocker, punter, and passer, Champion is a valuable addition to any team. Champion weighs 180 pounds.

A former star and captain of the Memphis Cyclone, Charles Flanery, will alternate at halfback on the Southern Methodist University varsity eleven this year. A transfer from Decatur Baptist College, Flanery played on the S. M. U. freshman team last year and was one of the star performers at half. Flanery, weighing 180 pounds, is the fastest man on the squad.

G. C. Baskerville, a member of the 1934-35 district championship Cyclone football team, will report for freshman grid practice at Texas Tech, Lubbock, this year. Weighing almost 200 pounds, Baskerville will try out for either a tackle or an end berth.

Cecil Grimes, tackle on last year's squad, will try out for the freshman team at Canyon. Grimes is a big, husky tackle and has three years of high school experience, although he will be handicapped by his lack of speed.

Fred Sanders, 215-pound tackle on last year's local team, and Bud McAbee, captain and center on the team of last year, will leave shortly for Stephenville to try out for places on the John Tarleton College eleven.
