
CHEVROLET ANNOUNCES

A PLEA FOR TOLERANCE

With one of the hottest political fights to ever surcharge the already heated air of the state ruled over by Old Man Texas in the offing, the electorate must make a decision as to how it will conduct itself-whether as spectators removed from the field of conflict or as active participants in a gubernatorial campaign whose thunder will be wont to echo down political corridors long after the last vote has been counted. Texas has been torn asunder so often-old wounds have healed so slowly-that we hope the bulk of our citizenship will refrain from indulging over-much in a campaign where the lines are se closely drawn between opposing factions. We have seen the time in Texas when brother has been aligned against brother; friend against friend, house against house. A repetition of such a situation would be unfortunate and all but disastrous.

We believe that every sovereign voter within the confines of this state has the right of making his own choice, of voting his own conviction, without any outside domination of influence. If this is to be a free country, in practice as well as in theory, the obligations of good citizenship demand that a voter express his preference at the polls, regardless of what Mr. Brown or Mr. Smith thinks. If every man will vote for whom he pleases, without respect to factions who may seek to control his vote, freedom of thought and action will be realized. If, on the other hand, prejudices get the upper hand and spread abroad their insidious influences, freedom will become little more than a by-word for mockery.

Intolerance in this country has enjoyed its heyday since the close of the World War. Texas has been one of the chief battlefronts. How long must this condition last? We boast of the fact that we live


PROPOSING A CONSTITU-TIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER


4, 1930 Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 5 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: The Legislature shall meet every two years at such time as may be provided by law and at other times when convened by the Governor. When convened in regular Session, the first thirty days thereof shall be devoted to the introduction of bills and resolution acting upon emergency appropris tions, passing upon the c ation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergen-cy matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special mes-sages to the Legislature; provided that during the succeeding thirty days of the regular session of the Legislature the various committees of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and read tions and other matters then pending; and such emergency mat as may be submitted by the Gov. ernor; Provided further that dur-ing the following sixty days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as may be then pending and upon such emergency matters as may be sub ted by the Governor in spe messages to the Legislature; pro
