



It can not believe that the Government will change its methods of so many years, methods imposed upon the people by force, despite the possibility of such assurances guarantee.

MANDAMUS AWARDED IN LICHTFOOT CASE

Attorney General Wins Before Supreme Court In Colquitt Controversy.

Austin, Tex., March 22.- Attorney General Lightfoot was this morning awarded the mandamus requiring State Treasurer Sparks to pay the voucher issued in favor of Attorney Terrell, employed by the Attorney General, the Supreme Court rendering its decision in the case. This adds another chapter to the controversy between Gov. Colquitt and Attorney General Lightfoot, involving the right of the latter to employ special counsel.

The decision of the Supreme Court sustained the Attorney General's every eontention and ruled that the contract between Terrell and the State was binding upon the latter, as the At-


