8 OIL STATES ADOPT PLANS

Request Congress To Permit States To Enter Pact for Conservation of Oil

PONCA CITY, Okla., Jan. 4.—Representatives of governors of eight oil states adopted unanimously yesterday a resolution requesting Congress to pass laws permitting states to enter into a compact for conservation of oil and prevention of waste.

No Decision Made On Ely Successor

AUSTIN, Jan. 4.—Governor-elect James V. Allred said yesterday his appointment of a member of the Texas Highway Commission would be delayed "for some time yet." He noted the term of W. R. Ely, Abilene, did not expire until February 15.

TEXAS SOLONS GATHER FOR SESSION

Relief Problems Are Main Issue; Will Start Tuesday

AUSTIN, Jan. 4.—The staggering task of providing food, clothing and shelter for Texas indigent thousands occupied a prominent place in pre-session discussion as legislators gathered for the opening of the 44th legislature Tuesday.

Governor-elect James V. Allred and his advisors; the state board of control, relief disbursement agency, Adam Johnson, state relief director, and members of both houses pondered deeply over ways to provide sufficient revenue to meet the state's share of the cost. During November there were 1,046,572 persons on direct or work relief.

Problem More Complex The state's problem has become more complex because of a recent order of the federal government decreeing that only able-bodied persons will be carried on federal relief rolls after Feb. 1. The job of caring for those physically unfit for employment will fall on the shoulders of the state and city and county governments. It is estimated that between 20 and 30 per cent of those on relief are unemployable.

State bonds totaling \$5,000,000 are available for relief after Feb. 1. Of this amount the legislature has authorized sale of \$1,500,000 for relief in February and is expected to vote for sale of the remainder early in the session.

Three Days Left For Cattle Buying Here After Friday

When the buying of drought stricken cattle in Memphis is completed tomorrow evening, only three more days will remain for purchases to be made in this county by government officials.

Purchases were scheduled to be completed on January 1, but an extension of 15 days was granted and buying definitely announced to cease on January 15. One group of buyers are working in Briscoe, Hall and Collingsworth counties. Buying in this county will be continued through Wednesday, Thursday and Saturday of next week, according to information from the office of County Agent James A. Jackson.

Thirteen checks totaling \$332 in payment of cattle purchased earlier in the buying program, were received this morning by the local office and are being distributed today.

LINDY IDENTIFIES BRUNO HAUPTMANN AS MAN WHOSE VOICE HE HEARD IN CEMETERY

GUILTY OF NASH PLOT

KANSAS CITY, Jan. 4.—Six persons were convicted by a jury in Federal court today of arranging the delivery plot which cost the lives of Frank Nash, convict, and four officers on the Union Station plaza here June 17, 1933.

The six who were convicted are Herbert "Deafy" Farmer, and his wife, of Joplin, Mo., Richard T. Galatas and Mrs. Galatas, Louis Stacci, and Fritz Malloy.

All charges against the seventh, Mrs. Frances Nash, widow of the convict Frank Nash, were dismissed in keeping with the prosecution agreement when the trial started by which she testified against her associates.

Judge Merrill E. Otis, district judge, dismissed the second and third charges against the six who were convicted as the case neared the jury yesterday afternoon. Charges of conspiracy to harbor a federal prisoner and conspiracy to rescue a federal prisoner were dismissed.

The maximum sentence under the conviction on the first count is two years' imprisonment and a \$10,000 fine.

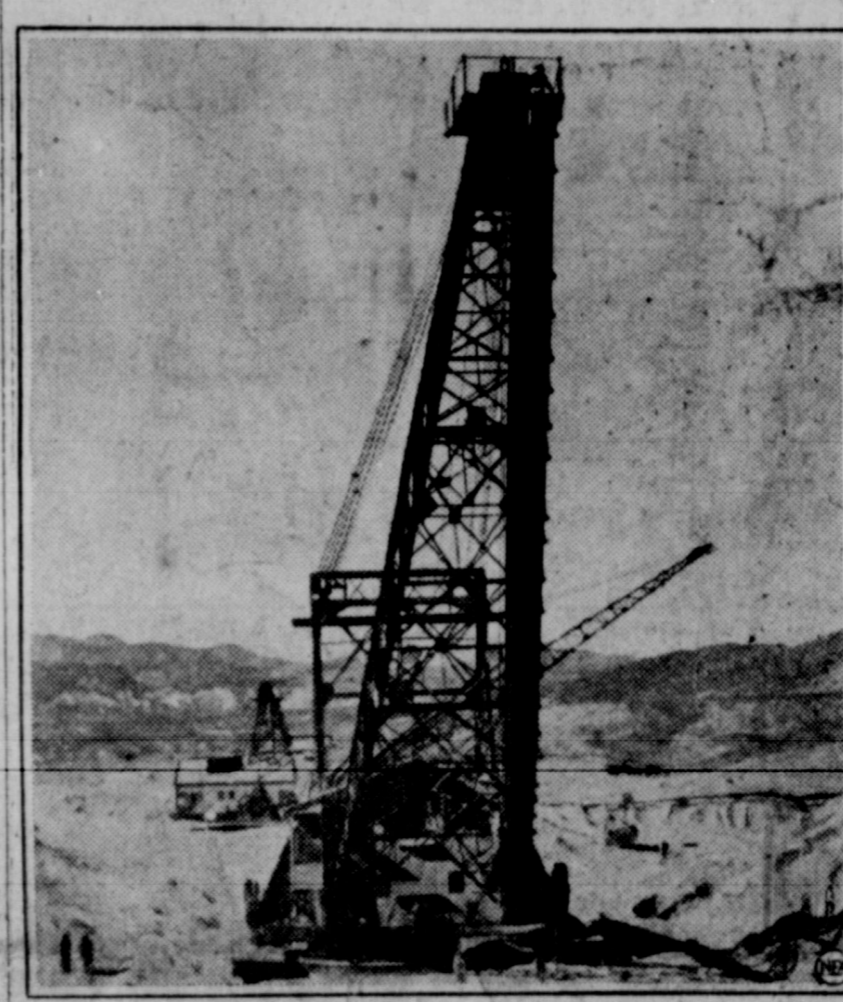
FUNERAL RITES FOR MRS. J. M. GODFREY

FLEMINGTON, N. J., Jan. 4.—The first week of the trial of Bruno Hauptmann ended at 4 p. m. today, to be resumed at 10 a. m. Monday.

FLEMINGTON, N. J., Jan. 4.—Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh today identified Bruno Richard Hauptmann as the man whose voice he heard in the Bronx cemetery when he paid through Dr. John F. Condon a \$50,000 ransom to get back his kidnaped baby.

"Since that night in Straymond's cemetery," the prosecutor asked, "did you hear the same voice?"

"Yes."
"Whose was that voice?"
"Mr. Hauptmann's," Lindbergh replied.

Hauptmann flushed. When the flier's ransom story was ended, Attorney General David T. Wilentz turned him over to Edward J. Rely, defense counsel, for (Continued on Page 8)

Really Ancient Coin Is Over 600 Years Old

Speaking of old coins, how does one over 600 years old do for age?

The coin is of copper, about the size of a half-dollar. On one side is a star, centered by Chinese writing and the figure "10." The reverse side has another star shaped figure, although constructed in curves, and is centered by more writing and the date 1330.

'NEW, GREATLY ENLARGED PLAN' OF RELIEF IS PROPOSED BY FDR

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—A "new and greatly enlarged plan" of work relief was proposed to congress today by President Roosevelt.

Without estimating the cost or going into great detail, he declared that instead of continuing outright doles, the government should put three and a half million unemployed to work at slum clearance, elimination of grade crossings and other permanent public works.

He assured that figures to be proposed for this in a budget message Monday will be "within the sound credit of the government."

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—Largely surprised by the scope of undertakings proposed and because the cost was not estimated, legislators were slow to comment upon the message that President Roosevelt delivered today before a joint session of the senate and house. Chairman Jones of the house agriculture committee characterized it as "sound and constructive."

The President was applauded when he said he looked forward to "genuine friendships" between himself and congress.

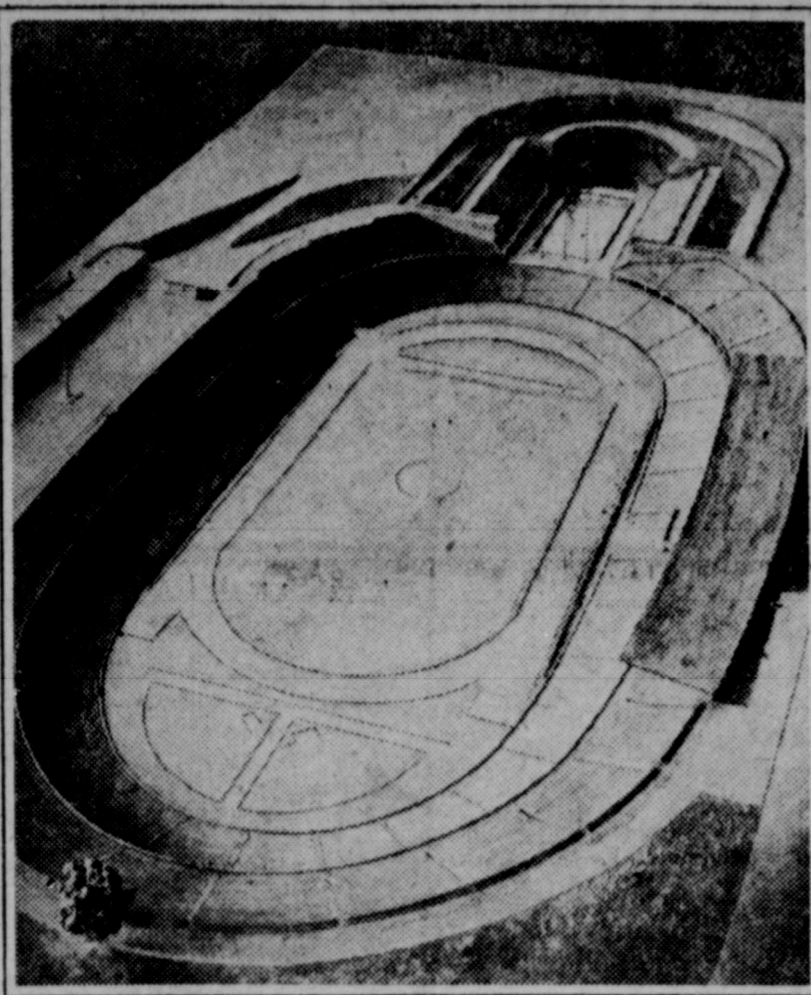

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 4.—The Santa Anita Handicap! Will it be the greatest race ever run, just an ordinary, over-publicized overnight event, or a complete farce? I'm not trying to throw cold water on the enthusiasm of the natives out here. That would be impossible, anyway.

These may be hard lines to write about a \$100,000 number, but the past is overflowing with examples of races of the Santa Anita sort which have turned out to be nothing more than hollow echoes of publicity departments.

No one will deny that if Twenty Grand, one of the most remarkable horses of our day; Equipoise, Mate, Cavalcade, Gusto, Tick On, Head Play, Fairno, Azucar, and Victor Emanuel's English thoroughbred, Statesman, go to the post at the new \$1,250,000 Santa Anita track on Feb. 23, the race will be one of the finest ever staged.

If these horses should be right, and race up to their class, a \$100,000 purse would be well justified.

But, do you remember the Havre de Grace Cup Handicap of 1932? The entries that day carried the names of Twenty Grand, Equipoise, Jack High, Tred Avon, Mate, and half a dozen other crack horses. Possibly no entry list ever carried such a high-class group. But race fans were sorely disappointed to find not three of the top ones in the event—all scratched in the middle of the race day. Equipoise beat a poor field with ease.

There's Many a Slip

And do you remember the strenuous efforts of the Narragansett management to make a great race during the last fall? It was to be a contest of Equipoise, Cavalcade, and Discovery. Not one of them got to the post, and the \$25,000 purse was won by Time Supply, a good horse, but one not fit to warm the others up. Time Supply also captured the recent \$25,000 Bay Meadows Handicap.

Now look over the list of entries for the Santa Anita Handicap. Twenty Grand has twice been laid up for breakdowns, and has not faced the barrier for more than two years. After his first breakdown, he got to the post for only two races, and could hardly finish the second, beaten by a horse not fit to enter the

same race with him. What are his chances to stand training, and more important, to be ready for a given race on a given day?

Equipoise has been laid up several times. He was out for a year, missing all his 3-year-old stake engagements. This year he has not been right, and training him has been painful for both horse and trainer. True, he's running soundly again, after being out most of the summer, but who can say what will be his fate in the next two months?

Cavalcade, too, is unsound. He retired in mid-season because of leg injuries, and if he shows any signs of giving way in his present training he will not even be shipped west.

Indeed, you might well call the Santa Anita Affair the "race of cripples." And why not? Tick On has been laid up at least once. Head Play has been hospitalized twice, and any number of others, such as Observant, Sarada, Riskulus, Mad Frump, and Ladysman have visited the veterinarian.
