Fore the 30,1913 , they lacked $\$ 1$. 601,378 31 of collecting enough, and while the figures for the fiscal year ending June 30,1914 , are not all available, enough is known to make certain that the railroads of this state will have a net deficit or loss of about Eight Million Dollars.
