**Rain Plenty Early  
For Late Cotton  
—Still Looks Good**

The rain did not come too late for some of the cotton in Hall County, to say the least.

Lee Thornton brought to The Democrat office Wednesday two stalks of cotton, one of which was planted April 10 and the other May 20. The late cotton was loaded with bolls and was about twice as tall as the early cotton, which had only one boll on it.

Mr. Thornton estimated that the field from which the late cotton was taken would make between one-half to a bale per acre. The other would make very little cotton, he said.

The rain which fell Monday brought between one and two inches of moisture to his farm just south and east of Memphis, Mr. Thornton said, and the ground was wet approximately eight inches deep.

Hardly waiting until the primary votes were counted, Deskins Wells, who led his nearest opponent in the 18th Congressional race by approximately 6,000 votes, plunged into the run-off campaign with vigor, visiting eight counties last week.

"I am visiting each of the counties in the district as rapidly as possible," Wells declared, "and I would like to personally thank as many as possible of the 15, 375 men and women who loyally supported me in the first primary."

During the last week, Wells visited the northern part of the district, while spending the week-end in the extreme southern part of the district.

Not to be outdone by their hardworking candidate, the farmers, ranchers, and just "plain" people of Wells' home county of Collingsworth, where he received over 81 per cent of the total vote, are working day and night on a campaign that is reaching every section of the Panhandle.

Justice Candidate Campaigns in City

Judge James P. Alexander of Waco, run-off candidate for chief justice of the Texas Supreme Court, brought his campaign to Memphis Wednesday during an intensive campaign swing through West Texas. He conferred here with attorneys and others.

Judge Alexander has been associate justice of the Texas Tenth Court of Appeals for almost 10 years. His supporters point out, however, is that the late Judge O. S. Lattimore, who has been dead several years, and that the voters should not be confused.

Judge Alexander has had 32 years of continuous legal service, including 18 years as a judge, almost 10 years of which time has been on the bench of the Tenth District Appeals Court. He also had 14 years of experience as a practicing attorney before becoming a judge. Also, for the past 29 years he has been teaching legal procedure and practice court early mornings and at noon as a professor of law at Baylor University at Waco.

Editor's Note—The following is a summary of the news pertaining to the European war for the past four days. News of August 6 is given first, followed by that of the previous three days, beginning with August 3.

AUGUST 6
Mussolini's army got into high gear and started playing for the biggest stakes it has sought since Italy's entrance into the war. The Italians began the invasion of Egypt and British Somaliland, in the offensive movement to wrest Egypt and Northern Africa from the grip of Great Britain.

A plea by a U. S. envoy to al-d food to be shipped to starving citizens of Belgium will probably be refused by Great Britain, it was reported. AUGUST 3
