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Deskins Wells, Eugene Worley Left in Race for Congress Post

The scramble among the 12 candidates for U. S. Congress from the 18th district was left up to two men last Saturday as Panhandle voters placed Deskins Wells of Wellington and Eugene Worley of Shamrock in the run-off, to be held August 24.

Wells led the ticket with a total of almost 6,000 votes over his nearest opponent. Wells, editor from Wellington, polled 15,373 votes to 9,386 votes for Worley, former state representative. The count is unofficial and is not final. E. T. Miller of Amarillo finished.

Pioneer of Quail, W. I. Atkinson, Dies After Brief Illness

W. I. Atkinson of Quail, pioneer Collingsworth man and well-known to many old-timers in Hall County, died in Wellington Thursday morning of last week after an illness of only a few days.

Funeral services were held Friday afternoon from the First Methodist Church in Quail, with Rev. T. M. Johnston, presiding elder from Stamford, in charge.

Survivors include his wife, seven children, Miss Robena Atkinson of Wellington, Granville Atkinson and Mrs. Glennis Davis of Cortez, Colo., Mrs. Velma Wilson of Phoenix, Ariz., Howard Atkinson, Miss Vena Atkinson, and W. I. Atkinson Jr., all of near Quail; and seven brothers and sisters, Henry Atkinson, Alvin Atkinson, V. D. Atkinson, Jerry Atkinson, and Mrs. Willie Graham of Wellington, Tom Atkinson of Phoenix, Ariz., and Edgar Atkinson, address unknown.

Atkinson was born 72 years ago in Gantville, Ala., and moved to Collingsworth County with his family in 1890. Later he served as county commissioner 10 years.

H. J. Rice Serves Last Day as Chief Clerk in Post Office; Now Retired, Will Move to Arlington Saturday to Live

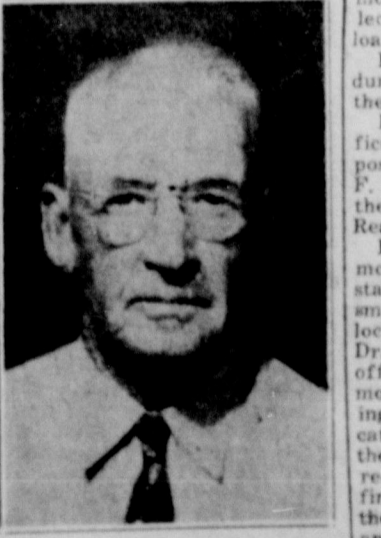
He's been in nearly every kind of business—ranch cook, barber, druggist, grocer, dry goods clerk, farmer, banker, assistant tax collector-assessor, assistant post master, and finally chief clerk at the Memphis post office—and yesterday he served his last day after nearly 28 years.

That, in brief, is the story of Henry Jessup Rice (and he claims he is the only "Jessup" in captivity).

Mr. Rice, who came to Hall County in 1908 (he said something about stealing a horse and leaving home), is moving to Arlington Saturday—and he intends to do nothing but "play croquet," which, incidentally, was not mentioned in the list of activities in which he has participated.

Mr. Rice was born about 12 miles west of Fort Worth July 17, 1875. He left there, spent four years in Oklahoma, part of which was spent in what was then Indian Territory, and then moved to Hall County.

He cooked on the Shoe Bar Ranch about nine months, then worked in the Lakeview post office for about two years. He even started to run for county clerk about that time, but withdrew from the race and started his long post office career in Memphis.

From 1918 to 1920, he served as assistant postmaster, and his title before his retirement yesterday was chief clerk and secretary of the local board of examiners for the Civil Service Commission.

For about nine months after 1920, Mr. Rice was out of the post office, worked four months

Initial plans for what is expected to be Hall County's biggest and most outstanding Dairy Show were laid this week, and the date set for the show as August 29.

Chosen as judge of the show is D. T. Simons, field representative of the American Jersey Cattle Club for the past 20 years. In addition, he has handled the National Dairy Show ring for the past ten years.

General superintendent of the Hall County show will be Howard A. Ferguson, who has acted as general superintendent of the dairy divisions of the Tri-State Fair since the beginning of the shows in Amarillo. He was superintendent of the first two Dairy Shows held in Plainview, and has owned cattle with records that have not been surpassed.

Closest of the county races was that among the four men seeking the office of sheriff. When the haze had all lifted, the unofficial count gave W. C. Anderson 840 votes, Joe N. Colvin 838, S. S. Coleman 825, and C. W. Crawford 636.

The official count will be released after the county Democratic committee has canvassed the ballots in their meeting set for the next Saturday afternoon. All tabulations made at the election party last Saturday night were unofficial.

Date For Election On Soil District May Be Set Soon

Land Use Planning Given Authority Polling Station

That an election, to determine whether a soil conservation district is to be organized in Hall County, will be held was indicated this week when the Land Use Planning Board was given authority by the State Soil Conservation Board to select a polling superintendent and name the various precincts for the proposed election.

No date for the election has been set, County Agent W. B. Hooser said, and the state board has not notified county officials as to the passing upon the election. The authority to select the polling superintendent, however, is an indication that the election will be held in the near future, it was explained. T. J. Cope of Parnell was named as the superintendent.

Educational meetings to explain the soil conservation law to landowners, will begin August 13. That date and the three following days, August 14, 15, and 16, have already been set to hold meetings, although the places which will be visited on the various dates have not been determined. Other dates will be announced later, Mr. Hooser said.

A hearing was held in Memphis several months ago and was pronounced "favorable" by the representative of the state board, who was present at the time.

.31 of Inch Rain Falls in Memphis

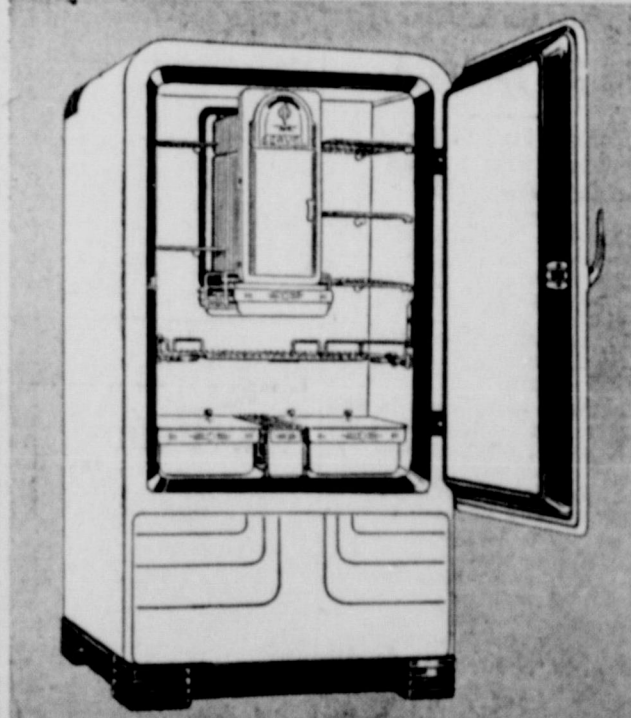

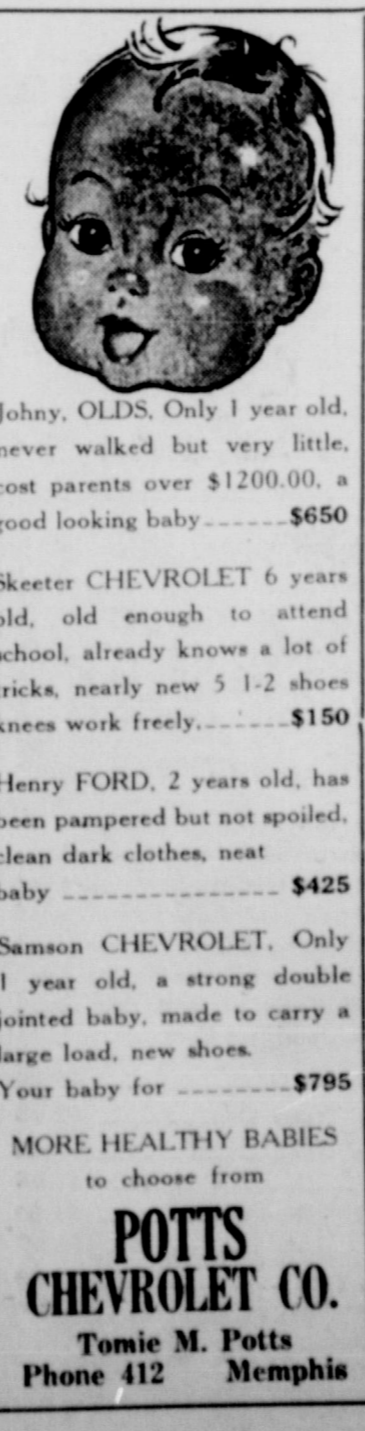
