## LAPSED INSURANCE - LIEUT. GOVERNOR'S TO BE REINSTATED

Government Cancels Back Premiums When Payments Resumed In 18 Months.

Washington, July 26 .- Discharged service men who let their Government insurance lapse were given the privilage of reinstating their policies within eighteen months without payment of back yesterday by Secretary Glass.

The new reinstatement regulation, one of a number under consideration, designed to make it possible for every discharged soldier, sailor and marine to continue Tuesday at the Government insurance after reonly requirement is that the man requesting reinstatement must be in good health as at the time of discharge and must pay the premium for the one month of grace in which his insurance was continued after he stopped payment and the premium for the months in which are requested reinstatement. Premiums for the intervening months will not be required.

Wheat, Oats, Other Small Grain Making Good Yields. Early Feed Exceptionally Fine-

Much of the small grain in Hall county has been threshed and is now being marketed. With the exception of one or two neighborhoods the yields are reported to be fine. These exceptions are confined to the low lands where the erop was injured by too much

Wheat is making an average of perhaps twenty-five bushels;oats from fifty to seventy-five and millet from twenty to thirty bushels. Barley, rye and other grains made unusually well, only small areas

being planted.

The early feed crop, principally maize, is said to be the heaviest ever grown in this section. Rains came right to make this crop fill, the heads being as heavy as the best late crops, which is excep-
