

Be it ordained by the city counsil of the city of Memphis, Hall County, Texas, that; Rules 1 to 54 inclusive of the Advisory Eupplement to the Sanitary Code for Texas be enacted and are hereby made a part of the Ordinances of the city of Memphis, Tex-

Sanitary Disposal of Sewerage, Garbage and Offal,

Rule 1. The local health authority disposal nuisances detrimental to publie health, source of filth, and cause of owners or occupant shall cause such to be removed, destroyed, or prevented, as the case may require. And it shall be unlawful for any prson within this city to allow any garbage, offal or any substance detrimental to publie health to accumlate or to remain on the premises owned, occupied or centrolled by him.
