

As Huge 'Flying Fortress' Awaited Air Baptism



Poised for a series of experimental flights, and then its supreme test, a hop from Seattle, Wash. to Dayton, O., the huge mystery Boeing bomber, said to be the largest land plane ever built, a veritable sky fortress, is pictured here in front and side views before making its air debut at Boeing field in Scattle. With a wing spread of 105 feet, and streamlined over its 70-foot length, the mammoth, 15ton low-wing monoplane has four 725 h. p. motors which can hurl it over a 2,500-mile non-stop range at a speed of from 200 to 250 miles an hour. From its aluminum body, like warts on a dinosaur, jut four machine gun turrets, shielded by unbreakable glass. Note two of these turrets, at the side and tor in the scene below. The monster air cruiser is protected by the latest safety devices-"robot" pilat, two-way radio telephones and a radio "homing" device. The Boeing, built by the company whose passenger craft now are used for speedy service on transcontinental lines, will compete at Dayton against other ships being considered for army purchase.

WORLD TO FACE A NEW WAR!

IF the depression through which the world has been staggering during the last five years is an outgrowth of the World War, what about the next war that everybody is preparing for? What sort of economic breakdown will it hand us-and what will it do to our slowly mending business structure?

It is in such questions as these that the real menace of war is to be found. If a burned child really does fear the fire, you would suppose that the world today would be willing to put up with almost anything imaginable rather than get into another war. On the contrary, however, it is drifting steadily toward a new one-letting the lesson of the last go unread and unheeded.

Let us have a look at the extent to which world business conditions have been reviving of

Figures compiled by the National Industrial Conference Board show a slow but appreciable rise in most of the indices by which world prosperity is measured. Business is better in England, Canada, Australia. Germany. Italy, Belgium, Spain, Finland and several Latin American countries. for instance, with recessions noted only in Holland, the United States and Mexi-

Unemployment has been declining in Denmark, Norway, Germany, France, Italy and Great Britain. World prices for such important raw materials as wheat, sugar, cotton, rubber, silk and tin are maintaining a steady rise. The physical volume of world trade is higher than it was a year ago.

All of these things make up a definitely encouraging picture. It does begin to look, at last, as if the world were beginning to drag itself out of the morass of trade stagnation. Let these favorable trends continue for another year or two and the world would be well on its way back toward normal times.

But no man dares predict that they will continue: and the reason for that is that the shadow of war continues to spread across the horizon. Italy seems committed to a war with Abyssinia, and no mortal man can tell what may come out of this. And no one needs to be told that, with the dislocating effect of a new war, all the delicate machinery of reviving world trade will be thrown out of gear anew.
