

War Council on Retirement Announces Cash and Supplies Contributed.

WORKERS WILL "CARRY ON."

Five Big Societies in World Wide Plan. H. P. Davison Heads International American Red Cross Commission. Dr. Livingston Farrand Permanent Leader of Peace Organization.

Washington .- (Special.) -- Henry P. Davison as chairman issues the following statement on behalf of the War Council of the American Red Cross: "To the American People :

"The War Council of the American Red Cross appointed by President Wilson on May 10, 1917, to carry on the work of the American Red Cross during the war, at their request and by vote of the Central Committee, ceased at midnight, February 28.

"Immediately the armistice was signed the War Council instituted was signed. An indication of the presstudies to determine when the strictly war work of the organization would have been sufficiently matured to en able the direction of affairs to be reed by the permanent staff. Henry P. Davison, being in Paris when the activities of the Red Cross Commisarmistice ,was signed, summoned a conference there of the heads of all lishing scale period. Active operations the Red Cross Commissions in Europe to canvass the situation. After consklering all the factors it was concluded to make the transition on March 1. The very fortunate choice of Dr. Livingston Farrand as the new chairman of the Central Committee, and thereby the permanent chief exutive of the Red Cross, makes possible the consummation of this plan under the most favorable conditions.

It has accordingly been determined that the guiding principle of Red Cross policy in France henceforth shall be to have punctilious regard to its every responsibility, but to direct efforts primarily to assisting its. French relief societies. The liberated and devastated regions of France have been divided by the government into small districts, each officially assigned to a designated French relief organization

"The American Red Cross work in France was initiated by a commission of eighteen men who landed on French shores June 13, 1917. Since then some 9,000 persons have been upon the rolls in France, of whom 7,000 were actively engaged when the armistice ent scale of the work will be obtained from the fact that the services of 6,000

persons are still required. "Our American Expeditionary Force having largely evacuated England, the sion there are naturally upon a diminare still in progress in Archangel and Siberia

"The work in Italy has been almost entirely on behalf of the civilian population of that country. In the critical hours of Italy's struggle the American people, through their Red Cross, sent a practical message of sympathy and relief, for which the government and people of Italy have never censed to express their gratitude.

Supplies and Personnel to Near East The occasion for such concentraion of effort in Italy, England, Bei gium and even in France having natur. ally and normally diminished, it has been possible to divert supplies and personnel in large measure to the aid of those people in the Near East who have hitherto been inaccessible to outside assistance, but whose sufferings upon an appalling scale The needs of these peoples are so vast that government alone can meet them. but the American Red Cross is making an effort to relieve immediately the more acute distress.

"An extensive group of American workers has been dispatched to carry vitally needed supplies, and to work this winter in the various Balkan comtries. In order to co-ordinate their ac civities, a Enligen commission has been established, with headquarters Rome, Italy, from which point about

Red Cross Will Continue. "Red Cross effort is thus far flung. It will continue to be so. But the movement represented by this work has likewise assumed an intimate place in the daily life of our people at home. The army of workers which has been recruited and trained during the war must not be demobilized. All our experience in the war shows clearly that there is an unlimited field for service of the kind which can be performed with peculiar effectiveness by the Red Cross. What its future tasks may be it is yet impossible to forecast. We know that so long as there is an American army in the field the Red Cross will have a special function to perform.

"Nothing could be of greater impor-tance to the American Red Cross than the plank just set in motion by the five great Red Cross societies of the world to develop a program of extended ac-tivities in the interest of humanity. The conception involves not alone efforts to relieve human suffering, but to prevent it; not alone a movement by the people of an Individual nation. but an attempt to arouse all people to a sense of their responsibility for the welfare of their fellow beings throughout the world. It is a program both ideal and practical. Ideal in that its supreme aim is nothing less than ver-Itable "Peace on earth good will to men," and practical in that it seeks to take means' and measures which are actually 'available and make them effective in meeting without delay the crisis which is daily recurrent in the live of all peoples. For accomplishing its mission in

the years of peace which must lie shend of us the Red Cross will require the ablest possible leadership, and must enjoy the continued support, sympathy, and participation in its work of the whole American people. It is particularly formunate that such a man as Dr. Lifingston Farrand should have seen selected as the permanent head of the organization. The unstinte fashion in which all our people gave of themselves throughout the war is the best assurance that our Red Cross will continue to receive that co-opera tion which will make its work a source of pride and inspiration to every American.

Mr. Davison, as chairman of the International Commission of the American Riel Cross, has undertaken to represent the American Red Cross in the preparation of the program for extended Red Cross activities, and will spend
