## MEMPHIS DEMOCRAT SMALL BALES PENALIZED

Farmers Will Be Docked If Bale's not Up to Standard.

I am instructed by my directors to again remind all oil mills, ginners, merchants, buyers and others who may be interested, that every exporter is obliged to sell his cotton in accordance with the printed contracts of either the Liverpool, Bremen, Havre, or New York Cotton Exchanges; and that non · compli ance with the said contracts renders the shippers liable to severe penalties. The rules relating to the weight of bales read as follows;

"Texas and Oklahoma cotton shall average 53,000 lbs. per 100 bales, with a 5 per cent variation."

Put into a few words, the rule is that Texas and Oklahoma cotton must average between 50, 350 and 55,050 lbs. per 100 bales. If, therefore, any single invoice averages in weight below 503 lbs. per bale, it is not in accordance with the contract, and the party responsible for the light weight of the bales should be penalized in the same way that the shipper is penalized abroad.

Please, therefore, take notice that a resolution has been passed by this exchange, governing its members, that hereafter all light weight bales will be docked

as follows. 401 to 450 lbs. \$ . 50 per bale. 351 to 400 lbs. 1.00 per bale. 301 to 350 lbs. 2.00 per bale: 300 lbs. and under, unmerchantable, and the buyer to have the right of rejecting outright, or ac-

### ABYSSINIAN FEASTS.

Strange Spectacles That Saver of th Days of Home

Europeans who have visited the court of the king of Abyssinia agree in describing life in that realm as peculiarly like what we suppose the life of the nations of antiquity to have been. By some it is spoken of as a reproduction of Europe in the middle ages; others go much further and call it "Homeric." What they mean may be inferred from the experience of the French Prince Henry of Orleans,

who attended a banquet given to him by the king of kings. It was the day after the great Abyssinian festival of St. Raguel, and the prince and his suit were invited to dine with Menelik at the palace. The negus sat on a raised platform above his guests, who were served somewhat in the European manner with various kinds of food and with hydromel, a wine of honey. and araki, another Abyasinian beverage.

But this meal was only a prelude to the real Homeric scene. After the king and his European guests had eaten a curtain of rude tapestry was drawn, disclosing the main part of the king's hall. Then the Europeans saw a strange and antique spectacle, all the king's officers, even the subalterns, entering to partake of a feast to be offered in real Abyssinian fashion.

They marched in groups, clad in barbarous military attire, swarthy and most picturesque warriors, who seemed to be issuing from the midst of ancient solemnity. They formed in circles about a great number of hampers containing Abyssinian cakes. This they did without any form of salutation to the negus. whose guests the office s now were.

The king's musicians blew a long blast on their trumpets, and the guests sat down. And now really Homeric viands were brought in, great quarters of beef roasted whole and similar quarters of mutton. The servants who brought them held them aloft with the sticks on which they were impaled. and the guests, drawing long, sharp knives, cut off pieces and proceeded to eat them. At the same time large cups made of the horns of cattle
