Ancient Works of Art

century Chinese production, with a "secret" design, the only known specimen of the period of the Emperor Hung Chih (1488-1505), has just been acquired by the British museum. It is decorated with green dragons, but the "secret" design, almost invisible at first sight, represents rocks standing out of waves, and was traced very finely and faintly with a needle stylus before the vase was glazed. "There is no special significance so far as I know in these secret designs," said official of the museum. "It is mply a feature of Chinese art." The arved figure of a bull found in Babyonia, and believed to be about 5,000 years old, minus legs, arms and tall, has also been added to the collection. it is thought that it was used for religious purposes. - MARKET PAR




