17 AMERICANS ROBBED AND MURDERED BY BANDITS

No. 29

Taken From Train, Stripped of Their Clothing and Stood by Car and Shot-One Escapes.

El Paso, Texas, Jan. 11 .- Seventeen persons, all believed to have been Americans, were killed by Mexican bandits yesterday, after having been taken from a Mexican Northwestern train fifty miles west of Chihuahua and stripped of their clothing, according to a message received here tonight by H. C. Myles, a British Vice Counsul here, from British Counsul Scovall at Chihuahua City.

The train on which the Americans were traveling from Chihuahua City to Cushihuirachic, Chihuahua, carried thousands of dollars in currency and a large quantity of supplies sent by the American Smelting and Refining Company to its mines in Cusihuiriachic

It is believed here that all of the eighteen American mining men known by means of a check on Mexican passports to have been in Chihuahua City were on board the looted train.

Thomas M. Holmes, the only known survivor, stated, however, in his brief telegram giving the first news of the raid, that he counted but seventeen Americans taken from the train.

It is supposed the bandits belonged to the forces of General Jose Rodriguez, a Villa supporter, known to be operating in Chihuahua against the de facto government. Almost immediately after the first news of the raid was received a censorship was imposed between Juarez and Chihuahua City by Carranza officials. This action was taken, it was said, "until the story could be verified from official Mexican sources."

Instinct of Blackbirds.

While residing in the country some years ago and walking out one evening. I found a nest of young blackbirds. The young birds were almost fledged. Taking them home with me, I put them in a cage and the next morning hung them out under a tree, and in about an hour I saw the old birds at the cage, evidently delighted to find their young. The old birds came regularly every two hours and fed them with worms and grubs. This continued for two days, the old birds trying all in their power to get the young ones out. Or the third day I noticed the old bird: bring a berry, which they gave the young ones, two of which died that evening and the rest next day. The old birds then left off coming. The berries on examination proved to be the seeds of the Atropa belladonna or deadly nightshade. This convinced me of what I had heard about these birds destroying their young if allowed to feed them in imprisonment. I am told that other birds have the same instinct.

How to Soften the Elbows.




